*WHEREAS, Quezon City continues to advance programs that promote environmental sustainability, responsible consumption, and food security under its zero waste and climate change initiatives;*

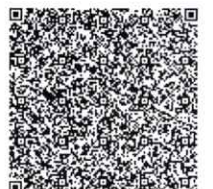
*WHEREAS, food waste poses both environmental and social challenges, contributing to landfill accumulation while many communities, particularly nutritionally-at-risk school-age children, remain in need of adequate and nutritious food;*

WHEREAS, as part of the observance of Zero Waste Month, the Quezon City Climate Change and Environmental Sustainability Department (CCESD) implemented the Food Rescue Program, which provides food rescue kits and mechanisms to support the collection of safe and edible food surplus;


WHEREAS, food rescue practices help strengthen barangay-based feeding programs by redirecting surplus food toward community use, while simultaneously reducing waste and promoting environmental responsibility;

WHEREAS, encouraging the participation of both barangays and private sector partners in food rescue initiatives promotes shared responsibility, sustainable practices, and stronger public-private collaboration.

NOW, THEREFORE,

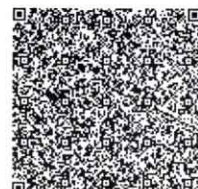
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF QUEZON CITY IN REGULAR SESSION ASSEMBLED, to encourage, as it does hereby encourage, barangays and private establishments in Quezon City to participate in and adopt food rescue practices in support of the City's zero waste initiatives and barangay-based feeding programs.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that barangays are encouraged to integrate food rescue mechanisms into their existing or planned barangay-based feeding programs, particularly those addressing the needs of nutritionally-at-risk children. 

RESOLVED FURTHERMORE, that private establishments are encouraged to safely donate or redirect food surplus in accordance with applicable health, sanitation, and safety standards, in support of the City's zero waste and food security goals. 








RESOLVED FINALLY, that the Quezon City Climate Change and Environmental Sustainability Department, together with other concerned offices, is encouraged to provide guidance, capacity-building, and coordination support to facilitate the effective implementation of food rescue practices
