There being no council member who opted to avail of the privilege hour, on motion, duly seconded, the same was dispensed with.

Subsequently, pursuant to the consensus of the August Body and in accordance with Resolution No. SP-10389, S-2026, Councilor Medalla (Aly) moved to transfer the regular session currently scheduled every Wednesday to Thursday at 9:00 A.M., effective July 9, 2026.  - o e) User – refers to a person, natural or juridical, who accesses or utilizes QC E-Services and whose personal information is processed.

When the session resumed, the Body proceeded with the items under second reading.

2. **SECOND READING:**

Upon the request of Councilor Visaya and with the concurrence of the Majority Floor Leader, PO23CC-128 was given precedence and first taken up by the Body for deliberation.

PO23CC-128 – AN ORDINANCE MANDATING THE USE OF THE QUEZON CITY MARRIAGE REGISTRATION ONLINE (QC-MRO) SYSTEM AND PROVIDING GUIDELINES FOR ITS IMPLEMENTATION (Introduced by Councilor *JOSEPH JOE VISAYA*)

- An amended version is attached on pages 163-167 of the order of business.

The Committee on Laws, Rules & Internal Government recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- that, an amended version of the proposed measure will be submitted; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

The Committee on Social Services recommended approval, with amendment:

- that, Mr. Ken Barrera, Chief of the Marriage Division of the City Civil Registry Department, has expressed his strong support for the proposed measure. Emphasizing that this Ordinance is needed to implement the Online Registration of Marriage Certificates. And that this has been integrated already to the QC E-services website; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers

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The Committee on Information & Communication Technology or Cybertechnology recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- to adopt the amended version to be submitted in the Committee on Laws, Rules & Internal Government; and
- to include Councilors Atty. Jesus Miguel Suntay, Wencerom Benedict C. Lagumbay, Luigi D. Pumaren, Victor “Vic” D. Bernardo, Erwin Rey “Cocoy” A. Medina and Jhon Angelli “Sami” C. Neri as Co-Introducers

Thereupon, on motion of Councilor Visaya, duly seconded, **PO23CC-128** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from the Proponent, and the adoption of the amendments made:

- The primary objective of the proposed ordinance is to formally establish the Marriage Registration Online (MRO) as a permanent program of the Quezon City Government, thereby ensuring its continuity, mandating its regular enhancement, and clearly defining the roles and responsibilities of the City Civil Registry Department and other concerned offices in its implementation.
- Over the past year, the Marriage Registration Online System has proven to be an essential tool in providing constituents with a convenient, efficient, and modernized means of processing marriage registrations. Its successful implementation highlights the need for a clear and sustainable policy framework that will institutionalize and further strengthen this valuable public service.
- Since its launch in November 2024, the Marriage Registration Online system has facilitated the registration of approximately 17,189 applicants, demonstrating the growing public reliance on this digital platform. This significant number underscores the program’s effectiveness in improving accessibility, reducing processing barriers, and bringing government services closer to the people. Such positive results further justify the need to institutionalize the system and ensure its continuity for the benefit of future generations of Quezon City residents.
- The City Administrator’s Office has expressed its support for the proposed measure, recognizing that the institutionalization of the QC-Marriage Registration Online is consistent with the City’s continuing efforts to modernize public service delivery and improve accessibility for constituents.
- In response to the recommendations of the City Administrator’s Office, the proposed ordinance was further strengthened by incorporating key provisions on funding mechanisms and the formulation of the Implementing Rules and Regulations. These additions provide a clearer framework for implementation, administration, and long-term sustainability, thereby ensuring the continued success of the program.
- The City Legal Department has reviewed the proposed ordinance and found its provisions to be legally sufficient and in proper order. The Department also expressed no legal objection to the measure and has recommended its approval, further affirming the ordinance’s consistency with existing laws, rules, and regulations.

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Councilor Melendez expressed support for the proposed measure, noting that it was a timely ordinance given that a lot of people are interested in getting married. She pointed out that because many of these couples were both working, the proposed ordinance would eliminate the hassle of repeatedly traveling back and forth just to verify requirements and guidelines. She commended the Proponent for introducing a proposed measure that would significantly assist individuals planning their marriage.

The Presiding Officer stated that the proposed ordinance was a significant help because many couples wanted to get married. He noted that this kind of setup would truly assist them in understanding the necessary steps and requirements. More importantly, it would allow them to organize their documents efficiently so that the service could be delivered to them on time.

- **Amendments:**

The Proponent manifested that an amended version of the proposed ordinance was submitted to incorporate the recommendations received from concerned offices. Among the modifications introduced are:

- To remove the word “**Republic**” in the 2nd Whereas;
- In **Section 3**, Establishment of the QC-MRO System, to add letter **c**, **Onsite Registration**. All applicants for marriage registration in Quezon City shall be filed through the Quezon City Marriage Registration Online (QC MRO) System. To ensure accessibility and inclusivity, the City Civil Registry Department shall provide an assisted MRO facility or assistance mechanism for applicants who may have limited internet access, lack of digital devices, or require technical assistance in completing the online registration process.
- In **Section 6**, to remove letter **c**, Quezon City Legal Department.
- To insert additional sections, viz:

“**Section 10. FUNDING.** The amount necessary for the implementation, operation, maintenance, and continuous enhancement of the Quezon City Marriage Registration Online (MRO) System shall be charged against the funds appropriated under the annual budget of the City Civil Registry Department, subject to existing accounting, auditing, budgeting, and procurement laws, rules, and regulations. Thereafter, such amount as may be necessary for its continued implementation shall be regularly included in the annual budget of the said Department.

Section 11. IMPLEMENTING RULES AND REGULATIONS. Within sixty (60) days from the effectivity of this Ordinance, the City Civil Registry Department, in coordination with the City Administrator’s Office and other concerned city departments and offices, shall promulgate the necessary Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) for the effective implementation of this Ordinance, consistent with its purpose and in accordance with existing laws, rules, and regulations.”

- The succeeding sections shall be renumbered accordingly.
- To adopt all the amendments made in the measure.
- To include all councilors present as co-introducers of the proposed measure.

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PO23CC-060 – AN ORDINANCE STRENGTHENING INTER-AGENCY COORDINATION AND PUBLIC PARTICIPATION IN NATIONAL GOVERNMENT INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS THEREBY AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. SP-2939, S-2020 “AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING ALL NATIONAL GOVERNMENT AGENCIES, OFFICES AND GOVERNMENT CORPORATIONS TO COORDINATE WITH THE QUEZON CITY GOVERNMENT ALL PROJECT PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION TO BE INTRODUCED, ROLL OUT OR IMPLEMENTED WITHIN QUEZON CITY” (*Introduced by Councilors ALY MEDALLA, RAM V. MEDALLA, IMEE RILLO, ALFRED VARGAS, MPA, LUIGI D. PUMAREN and JOSEPH P. JUICO*)

The Committees on Laws, Rules & Internal Government; City Planning, Building & Zoning; and Public Works & Infrastructure recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

On motion of Councilor Medalla (Aly), duly seconded, **PO23CC-060** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from the Lady Proponent, and the adoption of the amendments made:

- Quezon City Ordinance No. SP-2939, S-2020 requires all national government agencies, offices, and government corporations to coordinate with the city government on all project planning and implementation to be introduced, rolled out, or implemented within Quezon City.
- The proposed ordinance amends certain sections of SP-2939, S-2020, to enhance inter-agency coordination and to add some provisions that would ensure that all bases are covered when seeking coordination from the said bodies.
- All districts had separate public consultations regarding the proposals for the proposed ordinance. These include the incorporation of the barangays in terms of consultation when there is an infrastructure project to be built in a particular area.
- Coordination among Quezon City agencies and offices, including relevant department heads and punong barangays, is required. This also put them administratively liable for failure to relay knowledge on the plan or ongoing national government infrastructure project under their jurisdiction.
- The Certificate of Coordination before implementing any project shall now be required not only of national government agencies and offices, but also of government-owned corporations. No contractor of such a project or initiative shall proceed with construction without the presentation of a Certificate of Coordination.
- It was added that in the process of project validation, the City Engineering Department shall perform the project validation and research functions in relation to national government projects.
- It was also included in the Monitoring and Evaluation that the Office of the City Mayor, through the Coordinating Body that they have created, in collaboration with relevant national government agencies, shall institute mechanisms for the regular monitoring and evaluation of national government projects in Quezon City.

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- It was ensured that there is a Grievance and Reporting Mechanism wherein if a citizen sees a program that is not coordinated, they may report it to the QC Helpline, and it will be subject to investigation.
- A new section was added that a Certificate of Completion must be issued after the project has been inspected to ensure compliance with the plan designed and existing laws, and thereafter, the said certificate of completion must be issued.
- A new section was inserted for Penalties and Sanctions, and this reprimands any winning bidder or contractor found to be implementing a national government project within the City without the requisite certificate of coordination, and they shall be subject to the penalties and sanctions as indicated in the proposed ordinance.
- In the Implementing Rules and Regulations, the Coordinating Body was also added.
- This has been an ongoing issue since the middle of last year, the lack of coordination between the national government and local governments, in which they put their projects, was problematic. She hopes that the additional provisions that are being instituted in the amended ordinance to be approved, that the national government will make the city government aware of the programs and follow the plans of the city, such as the drainage master plan.

The Presiding Officer manifested his full support for the proposed measure and stated that he believed that it had gone through a series of committee hearings already, including the Committee on Laws. He added that the Proponent explained it very well in the plenary.

The Lady Proponent stated that aside from the regular committee hearings, the proposed ordinance has gone through public consultations based in the different districts of the city, including the participation of barangay officials.

- **Amendments:**

- To insert phrases in Section 3, thereby said section shall read:

“Section 3. CONDUCT OF PUBLIC CONSULTATION. – All national government agencies, offices, and **government-owned and controlled corporations** shall coordinate with the Quezon City Government, through the City Engineering Department, **or any such other office or entity designated by the City Mayor (“Coordinating Body”)** and barangays for the conduct of public consultation as part of project planning and conceptualization before any project or program is implemented in the City. The public consultation shall ensure the presence of vulnerable groups, non-government organizations (NGOs), civil society organizations (CSOs), people’s organizations (POs), private sector, and other relevant stakeholders. **The Quezon City Government, upon consultation, shall primarily ensure that the intended national government project is in line with the City’s development plans and/or current needs. This shall serve as a requirement for the granting of a Certificate of Coordination to be issued by the City Government after satisfaction of all requirements.**

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Provided that, the conduct of public consultations shall be a priority for projects with substantial community, environmental, or land-use impact, while minor or routine maintenance projects shall be exempted.

Provided further, that the conduct and completion of public consultations shall be held and documented 15 to 30 days from the submission of project proposals.

- In Section 4:
 - After the words “shall relay the” add the phrase, **“same to the Coordinating Body.”**
 - The phrase, **“The relevant department heads and Punong Barangay shall be held administratively liable for failure to relay knowledge on planned or ongoing national government infrastructure projects under their jurisdiction,”** shall be inserted after “the same to the Coordinating Body.”
- In Section 5:
 - After the words, “government agencies, offices,” add the words, **“and government-owned and corporations.”**
 - After “Quezon City”, add, **“and no contractor of such project or initiative shall proceed with construction, without the presentation of a Certificate of Coordination.”**
- Section 6, to be read as PROJECT VALIDATION. – **The City Engineering Department** of the Quezon City Government, in performing their project validation and research functions in relation to national governmental projects, shall proactively secure at least a one-year project plan of the proponent.
- Section 7, MONITORING AND EVALUATION. – **The Office of the City Mayor, through the Coordinating Body, in collaboration with the relevant national government agencies, offices, and government corporations, City Government offices and departments, and barangays, shall institute mechanisms for the regular monitoring and evaluation of national government projects in Quezon City.**
- A new section was added, wherein the QC Helpline shall receive complaints or reports on ongoing infrastructure projects;
- To add a new section, wherein a Certificate of Completion is added as a requirement;
- To add a new Section 12, PENALTIES AND SANCTIONS;
- To add and reflect the words, **Coordinating Body**, throughout the ordinance;
- Section 10, EFFECTIVITY, it shall take effect after fifteen (15) days from the publication in a newspaper of general circulation; and
- To include all councilors as introducers of the proposed measure.

The Committee on Laws, Rules & Internal Government recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- adopt amendments made during the discussion period;
- adopt the amended version of the proposed ordinance with specific amendments to be read verbatim during Second Reading;
- to include Councilors Atty. Vicente Belmonte Jr. and Aly Medalla as Co-Proponents of the measure; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

On motion of Councilor Pumaren, duly seconded, **PO23CC-064** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from his representation, and the adoption of the amendments made:

- Recent assessments have identified a significant learning gap among students, particularly in foundational subjects like reading, writing, and mathematics. According to a 2022 World Bank report, the Philippines faces a critical learning poverty rate estimated at 70% to 75%. This means that roughly seven out of ten Filipino children are unable to read proficiently, and fewer than 20% reach minimum proficiency levels in reading and math.
- Basic education in the country is in a state of crisis, leaving Filipino students lagging significantly behind their global counterparts. During the recent Board of Regents meeting, wherein they reviewed the Quezon City University College Admission Test (entrance examination), out of 18,367 examinees, only 4,203, or 23% of the students, were able to pass.
- The proposed ordinance aims to equip the youth of Quezon City with the skills and knowledge they need to thrive in a rapidly changing world. It empowers the local education system by aligning with and supporting the objectives of Quezon City Ordinance No. SP-3405, S-2025 (the Blended Learning Program Ordinance of Quezon City), and localizing the Academic Recovery and Accessible Learning (ARAL) Program pursuant to Republic Act No. 12028.

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- Integrating the program is designed to bridge critical learning gaps and deliver a transformative educational experience. The program components of the Educational Empowerment Program adopted the components of the Academic Recovery and Accessible Learning (ARAL) Program, which include:
 - ARAL Learning Recovery Component
 - Integration into School and Local Education Plans
 - Foundational Reform Integration
 - Volunteer and Mentor Program
 - Student-Parent Engagement

- The amended version of the proposed ordinance also adopted the recommendation of the Office of the City Administrator, wherein to ensure the legality of designating the City Department as a lead implementer and requires a DepEd-approved MOA for any partnership with the Schools Division Office-Quezon City. Thus, the same was integrated in Section 9 of the amended version of the proposed measure.

- During the Committee on Laws hearing, representatives from the Schools Division Office and the Education Affairs Unit were present. The representative of the Schools Division Office manifested that they have been wanting the localization of the ARAL program. Also, the recommendation of the Education Affairs Unit to localize the program was adopted in the amended version of the proposed ordinance.

- The passing of this ordinance is investing in the future of Quezon City by putting the youth in the best position to succeed.

- **Amendments:**
 - To adopt all amendments during the committee hearings.

 - To amend the title of the proposed ordinance, to be read as:
 “AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE EDUCATION EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM OF QUEZON CITY, INSTITUTIONALIZING THE ACADEMIC RECOVERY AND ACCESSIBLE LEARNING (ARAL) PROGRAM AS ITS LEARNING RECOVERY COMPONENT IN ALL PUBLIC SCHOOLS, IN SUPPORT OF REPUBLIC ACT NO. 12028, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.”

 - The Short Title under Section 1 shall be “Quezon City Education Empowerment Program.”

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- To include the localizing of the ARAL Program in the Declaration of Policy, thus Section 2 is read as follows:

“SECTION 2. Declaration of Policy. It is hereby declared the policy of Quezon City to prioritize the educational welfare of its youth by providing supplementary academic support to students, and that every child enrolled in its public schools has the right to quality, accessible, and recovery-oriented education. Recognizing the urgency of the learning crisis and the City’s responsibility under RA No. 12028 and the Local Government Code, Quezon City commits to localizing the ARAL Program through a comprehensive Education Empowerment Program that addresses learning gaps, strengthens foundational skills, and ensures that no learner is left behind.”

- To include a section stating the Objectives of the ordinance to be read as follows:

“SECTION 3. Objectives. The Ordinance aims to:

- a. Institutionalize the ARAL Program under RA No. 12028 as the City’s core learning recovery component;
- b. Address learning gaps arising from environmental, nutritional, mental health, and other circumstances affecting the educational development of Quezon City’s youth;
- c. Foster a supportive, inclusive, and accessible learning environment in all public schools;
- d. Integrate nutrition, health, and socio-emotional support as preconditions for effective learning recovery;
- e. Empower students to achieve their full academic potential and align them with expected learning competencies; and
- f. Strengthen coordination among LGU, DepEd, and partner institutions for sustained and measurable learning recovery outcomes.”

- To add a section for Coverage, which shall be read as follows:

“SECTION 4. Coverage. This ordinance shall apply to all learners, from Kindergarten to Grade 12 (Senior High), enrolled in public basic education institutions within the jurisdiction of the LGU, particularly:

- Learners below minimum proficiency in reading, mathematics, and science.
- Balik-Aral Learners.
- Learners identified through DepEd assessments and classroom-based evaluations pursuant to RA No. 12028.”

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- To amend the Program Components adopting the ARAL Program, to be read as follows:

“SECTION 6. Program Components. The Education Empowerment Program shall include the following components:

- a. ARAL Learning Recovery Component.
- b. Integration into School and Local Education Plans.
- c. Foundational Reform Integration.
- d. Volunteer and Mentor Program.
- e. Student-Parent Engagement.”

- To include the Expansion of the Local School Board Technical Working Group, to be read as follows:

“SECTION 7. Expanded Mandate of the Local School Board Technical Working Group. The implementation of this Ordinance shall be lodged with the existing Technical Working Group (TWG) under the Local School Board (LSB). In addition to its current composition and functions, the LSB TWG is hereby expanded to include the following representatives, as necessary, to effectively oversee the Education Empowerment Program:

- Education Affairs Unit (EAU)
- City Health Department
- Social Services Development Department
- Representatives from civil society organizations or higher education institutions engaged in tutoring or literacy initiatives

In addition to its existing functions, the LSB TWG shall, with respect to this Ordinance:

- Coordinate implementation of EEP and ARAL interventions across all participating public schools in Quezon City.
- Recommend SEF allocations for learning recovery programs under the EEP.
- Identify priority learners and schools using assessment and nutrition data.
- Facilitate partnerships with higher education institutions and volunteer organizations.
- Monitor program implementation and submit an Annual Local Learning Recovery Report to the LSB and Sangguniang Panglungsod.”

- To add a paragraph in the Funding to specify the disbursement of the Special Education Fund, to be read as follows:

“SECTION 8. Funding. The amount necessary for the initial implementation of this Ordinance shall be drawn from the Special Education Fund (SEF) or any other available funds, subject to existing accounting and auditing rules and regulations.”

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- To amend the section for Partnership Mechanism, to be read as follows:

“SECTION 9. Partnership Mechanism. The City Government of Quezon City may enter into a partnership with:

- DepEd Schools Division Office of Quezon City

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PO23CC-111 – AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A MENTAL HEALTH AND PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT PROGRAM FOR VICTIMS–SURVIVORS OF VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN AND THEIR CHILDREN (VAWC) WITHIN THE TERRITORIAL JURISDICTION OF QUEZON CITY (*Introduced by Councilor LUIGI D. PUMAREN*)

- An amended version is attached on pages 140-142 of the order of business.

The Committee on Laws, Rules & Internal Government recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- that, an amended version of the proposed ordinance will be submitted incorporating inputs from the committee hearing; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

The Committee on Health & Sanitation recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors as Co-Introducers of the measure

The Committee on Women, Family Relations and Gender Equality recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

Likewise, on motion of Councilor Pumaren, duly seconded, **PO23CC-111** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from the Proponent, and the adoption of the amendments made:

- The proposed ordinance aims to provide accessible mental health intervention to Violence Against Women and Children (VAWC) victims, protect them from further degradation, and restore their dignity.
- According to the latest data from the Crime Information Reporting and Analysis System (CIRAS) provided by the Philippine National Police (PNP) to the Philippine Commission on Women (PCW), there are 8,055 reported cases of the Anti-Violence Against Women and their Children Act in 2023 alone, which reflects a 3.76% increase from 7,763 reported cases in 2022.
- For too long, the collective response to Violence Against Women and Children has focused on the visible wounds, but beneath the surface of every survivor's story lies a deeper injury: the lasting trauma to the mind and to the spirit.
- This trauma manifests as anxiety, depression, Post-traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), and a profound sense of isolation. These are not minor side effects; they are barriers to recovery, to employment, to raising children, and to living a life of dignity. They are the silent sentences that keep victims trapped long after the physical violence has ceased.
- The proposed ordinance intends to establish comprehensive mental health and psychosocial support services for those affected.

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- In a review of the City Legal Department dated June 3, 2026, they posed no objection to the legal consideration of the said ordinance.
- In the recommendation of the Office of the City Administrator, dated March 17, 2026, it was stated that (which were adopted on the amended version of the proposed ordinance):
 - To retain the Social Services Development Department (SSDD) as the lead implementing agency, consistent with its mandate over other VAWC case management and social protection services.
 - Expressly provide for the Quezon City Health Department (QCHD) as a co-implementing agency or technical partner.
 - Consider including a provision authorizing the Social Services Development Department and Quezon City Health Department to enter into inter-office agreements or issue joint implementing guidelines, subject to existing budgetary and staffing constraints.
- It is imperative to ensure that victims of VAWC have access to timely, accessible, appropriate psychological assistance to facilitate their recovery, resilience, and reintegration into society. This measure underscores the commitment of the local government to prioritize the holistic health of its constituents and to foster a safe and supportive environment for all of its victims.

Councilor Delarmente manifested that the Quezon City Mental Health Code of 2022 (Ordinance No. SP-3158, S-2022) already exists. She then suggested amending the existing code to include the provisions of the proposed ordinance instead of creating a separate ordinance.

Councilor Pumaren explained that they sought to pursue the proposed ordinance because the City currently followed a general process in addressing mental health cases. He emphasized that the proposal aimed to provide a more specific approach for victims of Violence Against Women and Children (VAWC), recognizing that they required distinct forms of support and care.

The Presiding Officer emphasized that, as explained by the Minority Floor Leader, once the proposed ordinance was enacted, it would fall under the provisions of the Quezon City Mental Health Code.

Councilor Delarmente shared that the Quezon City Mental Health Code was more than 20 pages long and comprehensively covered various sectors. She reiterated that, instead of enacting a separate ordinance, the existing ordinance could simply be amended to incorporate provisions on mental health and psychosocial support programs for victims and survivors of Violence Against Women and Children (VAWC). She further suggested that, should the Proponent insist on the passage of the proposed ordinance, a whereas clause could be included acknowledging the existence of the Quezon City Mental Health Code of 2022.

Councilor Pumaren concurred with the manifestation of Councilor Delarmente and agreed to incorporate the same as part of the proposed amendments. The Proponent further stated that, as discussed with the Social Services Development Department (SSDD), the measure would be integrated into the Department's programs, particularly those relating to mental health services for victims of Violence Against Women and Children (VAWC).

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The Presiding Officer further stated that the Quezon City Mental Health Code was enacted to codify and consolidate all mental health-related issues, programs, and advocacies of the City, and that the proposed ordinance would fall under its provisions. He likewise agreed with the suggestion of Councilor Delarmente to amend the measure by including a *Whereas* clause recognizing the existence of the Quezon City Mental Health Code.

Councilor Herrera urged the Proponent to use the Quezon City Mental Health Code of 2022 as the basis for the proposed ordinance to ensure that the existing Code, which was more comprehensive in scope, would not be repealed. He reiterated that, as previously stated by the Presiding Officer, the proposed ordinance would fall under the provisions of the said Mental Health Code, as well as its Implementing Rules and Regulations.

The Presiding Officer noted the manifestations of Councilor Herrera.

Councilor Herrera raised another concern regarding the *Repealing Clause* of the ordinance proposed by Councilor Pumaren and inquired how the matter would be addressed.

Councilor Pumaren explained that the *Repealing Clause* of his proposed ordinance provides that “All ordinances, resolutions, rules, and regulations, or parts thereof inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, amended, or modified accordingly.”

Meanwhile, a recess was declared.

Upon resumption, Councilor Pumaren moved for the termination of the period of discussion.

- **Amendments:**

- To adopt all amendments during the committee hearings.
- To amend the section for Partnership and Coordination, to be read as follows:

“SECTION 8. PARTNERSHIPS AND COORDINATION. The Local Government of Quezon City, particularly the Quezon City Social Services Department and Quezon City Health Department, may enter into partnership or agreement with non-governmental organizations, health agencies, and other stakeholders to effectively implement the program.”

- To add a paragraph in the Implementation stating that the City Health shall be the technical partner of the Social Services Development Department, to wit:

“SECTION 9. IMPLEMENTATION. The Social Services Department, in coordination with the Quezon City Protection Center and City Health Department, shall be responsible for the implementation of this program.”

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Further, the Quezon City Health Department shall be the technical partner of the Social Services Department, particularly on:

- a. Immediate psychological and psychiatric intervention;
 - b. Trauma-focused therapy and clinical mental-health services; and
 - c. Development of clinical protocols, referrals, and professional standards.”
- To include in the Whereas clause that a Mental Health Code exists;
 - To remove Section 12 of the proposed ordinance; and
 - To include all councilors present as co-introducers of the said measure.

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

The Committee on Public Order and Security recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- that, Councilor Luigi D. Pumaren stated that he will make amendments to align the proposed measure with comments and recommendations stated by the resource persons; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

The Committee on Information & Communication Technology or Cybertechnology recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include Councilors Atty. Jesus Miguel Suntay, Wencerom Benedict C. Lagumbay, Charm Ferrer, CPA, MPA, JD, Victor “Vic” D. Bernardo, Erwin Rey “Cocoy” A. Medina, Jhon Angelli “Sami” C. Neri and Joseph Joe Visaya as Co- Introducers

On motion of Councilor Pumaren, duly seconded, **PO23CC-159** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from the Proponent, and the adoption of the amendments made:

- The rapid digitalization of daily life has brought significant benefits; however, it has also created a new landscape of risks, including cyber harassment, identity theft, online financial fraud, and the spread of misinformation. The “digital frontier” often lacks the immediate and localized support found in physical communities.

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- Based on cyber-related crime reports monitored by the Department of Information and Communications Technology (DICT) from 2023 to 2024, in 2024, a total of 1,452 complaints involved online libel, 1,287 involved computer-related identity theft, and 326 involved violations of the Anti-Photo and Video Voyeurism Act.
- Doxxing poses a significant threat to public order, safety, and the psychological well-being of Quezon City residents. As such, there is a need to establish a localized and immediate administrative response to address the unauthorized and malicious disclosure of personal information, which the proposed ordinance seeks to provide.
- Under Section 5 of the measure, at least one Quezon City Digital Safety Desk shall be established in each district of the city to serve as the primary coordinating center, connecting affected residents with the appropriate protection mechanisms. Section 6 establishes protection and support mechanisms for victims of doxxing, including psychosocial support, technical assistance, and legal services.
- The proposed ordinance shall not apply to the publication or dissemination of personal information when such acts are performed in good faith and fall within recognized categories, including journalistic activities, whistleblowing, lawful public-interest disclosures, reporting misconduct, and court-ordered disclosures.
- During the Committee Hearing, it was recommended to remove the “Identify and trace how personal information was obtained or disclosed” in Section 6, Paragraph b, due to a lack of forensic capabilities. In its stead, a section should be added that the city may enter into a Memorandum of Agreement with national agencies. In compliance, the said paragraph is removed, while the partnership section is included in the amended version of the ordinance.
- During the same hearing, the QC Information Technology Development Department manifested no objection to the proposed measure but recommended the inclusion of the City’s Hotline 122. The Office of the City Administrator further recommended that the PO may designate an existing office, since the Quezon City Data Privacy Committee is only a committee.
- In its review dated June 2, 2026, the City Legal Department recommended additional amendments to the proposed ordinance, including:
 - The inclusion of Affected Resident, Digital Safety Desk, and Doxxing Incidents in the definition of terms.
 - The incorporation of data protection safeguards under Section 5 of the Quezon City Digital Safety Desk.
 - The clarification under Section 4 (Coverage) is that the ordinance shall be without prejudice to the jurisdiction of the National Privacy Commission, law enforcement agencies, prosecutors, and the courts over the underlying acts and offenders.
 - The Digital Safety Desk shall facilitate access to legal liaison services.

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- In compliance with such, all recommendations were integrated into the amended version of the ordinance. By establishing a Digital Safety Desk, the City takes a proactive stance in protecting its constituents in the virtual world just as it does in the physical one.
- The proposed ordinance is therefore a critical step toward building a digitally resilient and empowered community.

Councilor Juico noted that the effective implementation of the proposed ordinance will require coordination with national government agencies, particularly the PNP and the NBI, which are tasked with determining whether reported incidents constitute doxxing. He explained that the City's role is limited to receiving complaints and facilitating referrals. He likewise expressed hope that a Memorandum of Agreement with the PNP Cybercrime Division and the NBI would be fulfilled upon the ordinance's passage.

The Proponent concurred with Councilor Juico's observations that working with the relevant national government agencies is important to ensure the effective implementation of the measure.

- **Amendments:**
 - To adopt the amendments made during the committee hearings.
 - To include the definitions of Affected Residents, Digital Safety Desk, and Doxxing Incidents in Section 3, Definition of Terms, and be read as follows:
 - **Affected Residents.** Any resident of Quezon City who has been subjected to, or is at imminent risk of being subjected to, an act of Doxxing, and who seeks assistance under this Ordinance.
 - **Digital Safety Desk.** A duly designated and trained city employee assigned to operate a Digital Safety Desk, responsible for receiving complaints, coordinating the delivery of protection mechanisms, and maintaining records in accordance with this Ordinance and applicable data privacy laws.
 - **Doxxing Incident.** Any reported or confirmed act of Doxxing affecting and Affected Resident within the territorial jurisdiction of Quezon City.
 - To amend Section 4, Coverage, to read as: "This Ordinance shall govern the establishment, operations, and data-processing activities of Quezon City offices implementing this Ordinance. Assistance under this Ordinance shall be available to residents of Quezon City affected by Doxxing, without prejudice to the jurisdiction of the national government agencies and competent courts over the underlying acts or offenders."

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- Additional paragraphs in Section 5 be included in order to include data protection safeguards for Desk operators and integration of QC Helpline 122. Thus, Section 5 be read as follows:

“Section 5. Quezon City Digital Safety Desk. Each district within the territorial jurisdiction of Quezon City shall establish at least one (1) Digital Safety Desk, which shall serve as the primary coordinating center linking Affected Residents to the appropriate protection mechanisms.

Each Digital Safety Desk shall be staffed by at least one (1) designated Digital Safety Desk Officer who shall have received training on data privacy laws, cyber-related offenses, psychosocial first aid, and the digital security measures, to be administered by the Quezon City Data Privacy Committee in coordination with the Quezon City Information Technology Development Department, or any other relevant agencies or departments prior to assumption of duties.

The Digital Safety Desks, as personal information controllers of complainant data, shall comply with all applicable provisions of Republic Act No. 10173 and its Implementing Rules and Regulations. Complainant information shall be processed only for the purposes authorized under this Ordinance, shall not be disclosed to unauthorized third parties, and shall be retained only for the period necessary to accomplish its purpose or as required by applicable law and regulations.

The QC Helpline 122 shall be integrated and serve as the primary telecommunications and digital hotline of the Digital Safety Desk to ensure accessibility and immediate routing of reporting of any doxxing incident.”

- To amend Paragraph c under Section 6 to read as follows:

“Legal Liaison Services. The Digital Safety Desk shall provide legal liaison services to affected residents by facilitating referrals to the National Privacy Commission (NPC) for the formal investigation of doxxing complaints.

Upon a final determination by the NPC that a violation of the Data Privacy Act has occurred, the following issuance of a formal recommendation certification to that effect, the Digital Safety Desk shall endorse the matter to the Department of Justice (DOJ) for the initiation of criminal proceedings and prosecution against the respondent.”

- To include another Section on Partnerships and Support Services, to read as follows:

“Partnerships and Support Services. The LGU of Quezon City may enter into a partnership agreement with other national government agencies to provide support and technical expertise.”

- The implementing agency and lead agency in crafting the Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) shall be the City Administrator’s Office instead of the Quezon City Data Privacy Committee.

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- To adjust the numbering of sections accordingly.
- To adopt the amended version of the ordinance.
- To include all councilors present as co-introducers of the measure.

- The proposed ordinance seeks to establish the Quezon City Adult Learner College Assistance Program (QC-ALCAP), a special scholarship program for qualified adult learners seeking to continue and complete their undergraduate education.
- The measure recognizes the challenges faced by adult learners in completing their college education, including financial difficulties, employment obligations, family responsibilities, and other socio-economic factors.
- The program aims to support qualified adult learners, particularly belonging to vulnerable and disadvantaged sectors, to continue and complete their undergraduate degree programs through financial assistance, academic support, and other support mechanisms.
- The proposed ordinance is expected to expand access to tertiary education, improve employment and livelihood opportunities, promote professional advancement, and workforce participation among Quezon City residents.

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- The Quezon City Youth Development Office (QCYDO) shall serve as the primary implementing office for the QC-ALCAP and shall be responsible for receiving and evaluating applications, identifying qualified beneficiaries in coordination with the Scholarship Screening Committee, and overseeing its implementation.
- The QCYDO shall coordinate with the Social Services Development Department (SSDD), higher education institutions, the Scholarship Screening Committee (SSC), and other relevant offices to ensure the effective implementation of the program, including the formulation of its Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR). Funding for the program shall be sourced from the Quezon City Government General Fund.

The Presiding Officer expressed that it is a significant measure and commended the Proponent.

BELMONTE, TO ACQUIRE THROUGH NEGOTIATED SALE AND TO EXECUTE A DEED OF ABSOLUTE SALE FOR THE PURCHASE OF PARCEL OF LAND, COVERED BY TRANSFER CERTIFICATE OF TITLE NO. 004-2018000454, REGISTERED UNDER THE NAME OF AGASSEE PROPERTIES AND HOLDING CORPORATION, WITH AN AREA OF TWO THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED SEVENTY (2,570) SQUARE METERS, MORE OR LESS, LOCATED AT VILLA BEATRIZ STREET, BARANGAY MATANDANG BALARA, QUEZON CITY, INTENDED FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF A SOCIALIZED HOUSING PROJECT FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE QUEZON CITY'S INFORMAL SETTLER FAMILIES (ISFs) (*Introduced by Councilor ATTY. VICENTE BELMONTE JR.*)

The Committee on Laws, Rules & Internal Government recommended approval, with amendment and/or remarks:

- to amend the billing of the measure to include Councilors Luigi D. Pumaren and Aly Medalla as Co-Principal authors thereof;
- that, pursuant to the suggestion of Councilor Wencerom Benedict C. Lagumbay, include all District III Councilors as Co-Introducers of the measure, considering that the subject property is located within their district; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

The Committees on Subdivision Planning & Real Estate; and Urban Poor & Human Settlement recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- to include Councilors Luigi D. Pumaren and Aly Medalla to be as Principal Co-Proponents of the measure; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

Thereupon, on omnibus motion of Councilor Belmonte (Vicente), duly seconded, **PR23CC-440, PR23CC-441, PR23CC-442, PR23CC-447, and PR23CC-755** were **APPROVED** on second reading, with the following manifestations from the Proponent and the adoption of the amendments made:

- The five (5) proposed measures share the same legal framework, procedural process, and social housing objectives. The main distinctions lie in ownership details, locations, and corresponding land titles. Each measure grants authority to City Mayor, Honorable Ma. Josefina G. Belmonte, to acquire strategic parcels of land through negotiated sale and to execute the corresponding Deeds of Absolute Sale.
- The measures are intended to directly benefit the Socialized Housing Program under the Housing Community Development and Resettlement Department.

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- Providing a clear and structured overview, the five (5) interrelated resolutions cover the following properties:
 - PR23CC-440 authorizes the acquisition of a 20,133 sq. m. parcel of land located in Barangay Payatas from Antony C. Syquia, married to Nina Gizella D. Syquia et al., covered by TCT Nos. 004-2025005531 and 004-2025005532. The acquisition will directly secure the on-site settlement of 504 target beneficiary families represented by the Hillside Village Homeowners Association Phase I, Inc., and the Acacia Talisay Village Homeowners Association Phase II, Inc.
 - PR23CC-441 authorizes the acquisition of a 1,000 sq. m. parcel of land located in Barangay Pasong Tamo from Spouses Rolando G. Peña and Daisy V. Peña, covered by TCT No. 004-2025010614. The acquisition will safeguard the land tenure security of 26 target beneficiary families organized under the C-10 Peña Property Neighborhood Association, Inc.
 - PR23CC-442 authorizes the acquisition of a 1,355 sq. m. parcel of land located in Barangay Matandang Balara (Old Balara) from Sonia Salonga-Pajaro, married to Edgardo Pajaro, covered by TCT No. 004-2021003467. The acquisition will directly benefit 34 target beneficiary families, particularly the January 16, 2026 fire victims, under the Pinagkaisa Neighborhood Association, Inc.
 - PR23CC-447 authorizes the acquisition of a 3,000 sq. m. parcel of land located in Barangay Gulod, Novaliches, Quezon City, from Marciano Angeles & Sons, Inc., covered by TCT No. RT-125639 (315456). The acquisition will provide security of tenure to 36 target beneficiary families under the Kawayanan Compound of Florentina Homeowners Association, Inc.
 - PR23CC-755 authorizes the acquisition of a 2,570 sq. m. parcel of land located on Villa Beatriz Street, Barangay Matandang Balara, from Agassee Properties and Holding Corporation, covered by TCT No. 004-2018000454. The acquisition will directly benefit 64 target beneficiary families of the Villa Beatriz 57-B Community Homeowners Association, Inc.
- The five (5) proposed measures had undergone thorough due diligence.
- The Presidents of the five (5) homeowners associations personally attended the committee hearings and formally expressed their full support and consent to the acquisition of the subject properties for the long-term security, welfare, and benefit of their respective members.
- The Informal Settler Families (ISFs) occupying those parcels of land sought the assistance of the Quezon City Government in acquiring the properties. Upon acquisition, the lands shall be awarded to the qualified beneficiaries through the Direct Sale Program. Under this scheme, pre-qualified beneficiaries may obtain individual land titles upon full payment of their respective lots.
- All five (5) corporate and individual landowners have formally submitted letters of intent and offers to sell. This mutual cooperation ensures smooth, frictionless, and negotiated transactions.

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- To protect the financial interests of the City, the City Assessor’s Office has carefully applied the City Appraisal Committee policy, specifically adjusted for properties occupied by ISFs. This institutional safeguard ensures the protection of City funds while offering fair and just compensation to the landowners.
- The funding required for these acquisitions is duly accounted for. These housing projects are explicitly included in the 2026 Project Procurement Management Plan (PPMP) of the Housing Community Development and Resettlement Department (HCDRD).
- To ensure equity, all 704 target beneficiary families shall undergo standard and rigorous screening and verification by the Beneficiary Selection Committee.
- The unified purpose is to fulfill the City Government’s commitment to providing decent, affordable, and in-city socialized housing for Quezon City’s informal settler families. Pursuant to Section 455 of the Local Government Code of 1991, the Council has the legislative authority to grant the Local Chief Executive the power to execute the corresponding Deeds of Absolute Sale.

The Presiding Officer, Vice Mayor Gian G. Sotto, manifested his full support for the proposed measure, as the administration has been an advocate of programs such as these.

- **Amendments:**

PR23CC-471 – A RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING AND SUPPORTING THE STRENGTHENED IMPLEMENTATION OF EXISTING QUEZON CITY ORDINANCES ON SMOKING AND VAPING, AND REQUESTING RELEVANT OFFICES AND INSTITUTIONS TO FURTHER ENHANCE ENFORCEMENT, COORDINATION, AND PUBLIC EDUCATION EFFORTS (*Introduced by Councilors DOROTHY A. DELARMENTE, M.D., JHON ANGELLI “Sami” C. NERI, ATTY. CHRISTOFFER ALLAN “Tope” LIQUIGAN, and JOSE MARIA “Mari” M. RODRIGUEZ*)

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The Committees on Laws, Rules & Internal Government; Health & Sanitation; and Public Order & Security recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

On motion of Councilor Delarmente, duly seconded, **PR23CC-471** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from the Proponent, and the **adoption of all amendments made during the committee hearings, and to include all councilors present as co-authors of the measure:**

- The proposed resolution recognizes and supports the strengthened implementation of existing Quezon City ordinances on smoking and vaping. Quezon City has long been a leader in public health protection, from Ordinance SP-1420, S-2004, which strengthened the smoking ban in public places; to SP-2341, which regulates the sale of e-cigarettes to minors; to SP-2737, which covers vape use in public areas; and most recently, SP-3328, which prohibits smoking and vaping in all city-owned parks.
- The Council has already laid down a strong legislative foundation; however, laws are only as effective as their implementation. This reinforces the commitment to fully implement existing ordinances. From a public health perspective, and as a physician, cigarette smoking remains one of the leading causes of preventable death. It contributes to cancer, heart disease, stroke, and chronic lung diseases. Second-hand smoke harms children, pregnant women, senior citizens, and even healthy adults who share the same space.
- Vaping, often marketed as safer, carries its own risks. Many vape products contain nicotine, a highly addictive substance, along with chemicals that may harm lung health. Emerging studies continue to raise concerns about their long-term effects. Most concerning is the growing exposure of minors to vaping products, as flavored and attractively packaged items appeal to youth. Nicotine affects the developing brain and increases the likelihood of lifelong addiction.
- Beyond health concerns, there are also environmental implications. Cigarette butts are among the most commonly littered items and contain toxic substances that can seep into soil and water systems. Disposable vape pods and cartridges also contribute to plastic and electronic waste.
- The proposed resolution calls for stronger enforcement, coordination, and sustained public education to protect our communities and youth. A smoke-free and vape-free Quezon City is not only a public health goal but also a responsibility owed to the next generation.

PR23CC-523 – A RESOLUTION CONDEMNING VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN IN POLITICS (VAWP) AND AFFIRMING QUEZON CITY’S COMMITMENT TO SAFE, RESPECTFUL, AND INCLUSIVE PARTICIPATION OF WOMEN IN GOVERNANCE AND PUBLIC LEADERSHIP *(Introduced by Councilors DOROTHY A. DELARMENTE, M.D., CANDY A. MEDINA, AIKO MELENDEZ and JHON ANGELLI “Sami” C. NERI)*

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The Committees on Laws, Rules & Internal Government; and Women, Family Relations & Gender Equality recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

On motion of Councilor Melendez, duly seconded, **PR23CC-523** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from the Proponent, and **the adoption of the amendments made in the committee hearings, and to include all councilors present as co-introducers of the measure:**

- The proposed measure was humbly submitted for consideration, affirming an important principle in democracy—that women must be able to participate in politics and governance free from harassment, intimidation, and violence.
- Women have long played a vital role in shaping communities and public policy. Today, more women are stepping forward to serve as leaders, public servants, and elected officials.
- Quezon City is fortunate to have many women leaders serving our people—from Barangay Captains and Kagawads to, most notably, Mayor Ma. Josefina G. Belmonte. Their dedication, competence, and commitment to public service have helped move the City forward and improve the lives of QCitizens.
- Despite these contributions, women in politics often face challenges and discrimination that go beyond the normal demands of public service and leadership.
- Many women leaders experience harassment, intimidation, personal attacks, and online abuse, particularly on social media platforms where gender-based insults, disinformation, and threats are sometimes used to silence or discredit women in public office.
- These actions are not only unfair to the individuals concerned but also weaken the foundations of democratic institutions. When women are discouraged from participating in public service, the quality and inclusiveness of governance are diminished.
- The measure, therefore, sends a clear message: Quezon City condemns violence against women in politics in all its forms and stands firmly for a political culture that upholds respect, equality, and professionalism.
- As they celebrate Women’s Month, the proposed measure serves as a reminder of the opportunity; however, it was filed under the committee level as early as March and has only now been referred to the Committee on Laws. It was intentionally aligned with Women’s Month for appropriate recognition and emphasis.
- By standing against violence and harassment directed at women in politics, the Council encourages more women, including the younger generation, to participate in leadership and public service.

The Presiding Officer, Vice Mayor Gian G. Sotto, manifested his full support for the proposed measure.

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Subsequently, **His Honor, Vice Mayor Sotto**, yielded the Chairmanship to **Councilor Bernard R. Herrera**, and a recess was declared. Following its resumption, the Body tackled PR23CC-528.

PR23CC-528 – A RESOLUTION EXPRESSING THE STRONG SUPPORT OF THE QUEZON CITY GOVERNMENT FOR THE PROPOSED MEASURE FILED BY SENATOR LOREN LEGARDA DECLARING THE MONTH OF APRIL AS “PHILIPPINE VETERANS’ MONTH” AND STRENGTHENING PROGRAMS THAT HONOR, PRESERVE, AND PROMOTE THE LEGACY AND WELFARE OF FILIPINO WAR VETERANS (*Introduced by Councilors DOROTHY A. DELARMENTE, M.D., TANY JOE “TJ” L. CALALAY, ERWIN REY “Cocoy” A. MEDINA and CANDY A. MEDINA*)

The Committees on Laws, Rules & Internal Government; and Tourism, Cultural Affairs & Heritage recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

On motion of Councilor Calalay, duly seconded, **PR23CC-528** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from the Proponent, and the **adoption of the amendments made in the committee hearings**:

- The proposed resolution expresses the strong support of the Quezon City Council for the proposed measure of Senator Loren Legarda declaring the month of April as Philippine Veterans Month. Filipino veterans represent the very best of the nation’s history. They stood in defense of freedom during times when the country faced grave threats to its sovereignty and democracy. Their courage, sacrifice, and love of country enabled the Philippines to endure some of the most difficult chapters of its past.
- Every year, Araw ng Kagitingan is commemorated on April 9 to honor the heroism of Filipino soldiers during World War II. However, beyond this single day of remembrance, the lessons of bravery, patriotism, and sacrifice deserve to be continuously remembered by present and future generations.
- The measure filed by Senator Loren Legarda seeks to strengthen national remembrance by declaring the entire month of April as Philippine Veterans Month. Through this proposal, programs honoring veterans will be expanded, their stories will be integrated into the educational system, and government agencies will be encouraged to work together to ensure that veterans receive the recognition, healthcare, and support they deserve.
- By supporting the proposed measure, the Quezon City Government joins the entire Filipino nation in honoring Filipino veterans, not only through words but through meaningful programs that preserve their legacy and ensure their welfare.

PR23CC-604 – A RESOLUTION ENCOURAGING THE DEVELOPMENT OF A QUEZON CITY DIGITAL EMPLOYMENT AND JOB-MATCHING PLATFORM FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES (PWDs) TO CONNECT QUALIFIED PWD JOB SEEKERS WITH INCLUSIVE EMPLOYERS AND EXPAND EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES IN THE CITY (*Introduced by Councilors WENCEROM BENEDICT C. LAGUMBAY, ATTY. JESUS MIGUEL SUNTAY, CANDY A. MEDINA, DOROTHY A. DELARMENTE, M.D., and ERWIN REY “Cocoy” A. MEDINA*)

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The Committees on Laws, Rules & Internal Government; Labor, Employment & Overseas Filipino Workers; and People with Disabilities recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

On motion of Councilor Lagumbay, duly seconded, **PR23CC-604** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from the Proponent, and **the adoption of the amendments made in the committee hearings**, and **to include all councilors present as co-introducers of the measure**:

- The proposed resolution encourages the development of a Quezon City digital employment and job-matching platform for Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) to connect qualified PWD job seekers with inclusive employers and expand employment opportunities in the City.
- The Constitution of the Republic of the Philippines recognizes the rights of persons with disabilities to participate fully in society and mandates the State to promote their welfare and integration into the mainstream of society; and Republic Act No. 7277, otherwise known as the Magna Carta for Persons with Disabilities, promotes equal opportunities for employment and encourages the public and private sectors to provide gainful employment to persons with disabilities.
- The proposed resolution aims for the Quezon City Government, through the initiative of the Persons with Disabilities Affairs Office (PDAO), the Public Employment Service Office (PESO), and the City Information and Communications Technology programs, to continue to promote employment and livelihood opportunities for Persons with Disabilities.
- Establishing and strengthening a digital employment platform dedicated to Persons with Disabilities may help connect qualified job seekers with inclusive employers and expand opportunities for remote and flexible work that are accessible.
- It is hereby resolved that the Quezon City Government, through the Persons with Disabilities Affairs Office (PDAO), the Public Employment Service Office (PESO), the City Information and Communications Technology Unit, and other relevant offices, is encouraged to explore the development or enhancement of a digital platform that can facilitate job matching, employment referrals, and career opportunities for Persons with Disabilities.
- The Public Employment Service Office (PESO) has already entered into contract signings with other platforms, which may serve as a starting point in bridging employment opportunities. This initiative aims to ensure that Persons with Disabilities who can work are provided access to jobs through these platforms as part of the services of the Quezon City Government.

Acting Presiding Officer, Councilor Bernard R. Herrera, stated that it is an opportune step.

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PR23CC-676 – A RESOLUTION RECOMMENDING THE IMPLEMENTATION OF A SOLARIZATION AND RENEWABLE ENERGY PROGRAM FOR QUEZON CITY GOVERNMENT FACILITIES IN SUPPORT OF THE NATIONAL ENERGY EMERGENCY RESPONSE (*Introduced by Councilors WENCEROM BENEDICT C. LAGUMBAY, JHON ANGELLI “Sami” C. NERI and DOROTHY A. DELARMENTE, M.D.*)

The Committee on Laws, Rules & Internal Government recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

The Committee on Energy, Water & Other Natural Resources recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure, namely: Councilors Ram V. Medalla, Nicole “Nikki” V. Crisologo, Joseph P. Juico, Bernard R. Herrera and Victor “Vic” D. Bernardo

On motion of Councilor Lagumbay, duly seconded, **PR23CC-676** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations and amendments from the Proponent:

- The proposed resolution recommends the implementation of a solarization and renewable energy program for Quezon City Government facilities in support of the national energy emergency response.
- The President of the Republic of the Philippines has declared a State of National Energy Emergency, emphasizing the need to ensure energy security and sustainability. The transition to renewable energy sources, such as solar power, is a key strategy in reducing dependence on traditional fuel sources and mitigating energy supply risks.
- Quezon City Government facilities, including barangay halls, health centers, schools, and public buildings, can benefit from renewable energy solutions to reduce operational costs and ensure energy reliability.
- The proposed resolution encourages the Quezon City Government, through the General Services Department, the City Engineering Department, and other relevant offices, to:
 1. Identify priority facilities suitable for solar panel installation, including barangay halls, health centers, and public schools.
 2. Develop a phased implementation plan for the solarization of city-owned facilities.
 3. Explore funding mechanisms, partnerships, and incentives for renewable energy projects.
 4. Ensure the proper maintenance and monitoring of all systems.
 5. Coordinate with national agencies, such as the Department of Energy, for technical assistance and support.
- The City Hall Compound is currently powered by renewable energy. It was suggested that all city facilities, particularly barangay halls, be encouraged to explore and transition to renewable energy to help address the current energy challenges.

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- **Amendments:**

- To amend the title as follows: “A RESOLUTION RECOMMENDING THE IMPLEMENTATION OF A SOLARIZATION AND RENEWABLE ENERGY PROGRAM FOR QUEZON CITY GOVERNMENT FACILITIES AND BARANGAYS IN SUPPORT OF THE NATIONAL ENERGY EMERGENCY RESPONSE.”

The Committees on Laws, Rules & Internal Government; and Health & Sanitation recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

On motion of Councilor Neri, duly seconded, **PR23CC-730** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with an appeal for support from his colleagues, following his manifestations and an amendment **to carry out all the modifications made in the committee meetings:**

- The measure addresses the most important community health priorities in the country, which is dengue prevention.
- Every year, many communities across the Philippines face recurring dengue cases, particularly during the rainy season when mosquito breeding becomes more common.
- Dengue is a preventable disease, but its control requires strong cooperation between the government and the community.
- The Aedes mosquito breeds in the stagnant water found in containers, discarded items, and other areas where water accumulates. Hence, one of the most effective strategies in preventing dengue is community participation in eliminating potential mosquito breeding sites.
- The resolution encourages the barangays, youth organizations, schools, and community groups to strengthen awareness, campaigns, and preventive activities that promote dengue control.

- While Quezon City has already implemented several important nutrition initiatives, such as Operation Timbang Plus and other monitoring programs, consolidating this data into a stronger and more coordinated monitoring system can significantly improve the way the city government plans and implements nutrition interventions.
- Strengthening the nutrition data systems empowers the city to make better decisions, direct programs to the communities that need them most, and ultimately improve the health and well-being of the children.
- The Proponent further encourages the support of the Body for the adoption of the proposed resolution.
