The 47th Regular Session was called to order at 2:17 P.M. by the Presiding Officer, Vice Mayo Sotto.

The Majority Floor Leader moved that PO23CC-116 be reverted on second reading.

Hearing no objection, the motion was carried.

Upon motion for its approval, Councilor Medalla (Aly) described the proposed Safe School Zone Ordinance, which regulates areas identified as school zones by the City Planning and Development Department and implements safety measures to protect students. She noted that the measure had undergone extensive public hearings and approved the same on second reading. However, based on the comments from the City Legal Department requiring its incorporation into the final version, a motion was made to revert the measure to second reading.

Since there are no other clarifications, the discussion was terminated, and the following revisions were adopted:

- To add in the last prefatory clause: “WHEREAS, Quezon City Ordinance No. SP-2636, S-2017 designates the Department of Public Order and Safety (DPOS) as the lead agency for road safety policies; however, in order to ensure consistency, policy coherence, and unified direction in the implementation of the traffic management and road safety initiatives, there is a need to designate the Traffic and Transport Management Department (TTMD) as the lead agency for the implementation of the said Code.”
- Under Section 3, Definition of Terms:
 - Letter **h**, School Zone shall now be defined as “The designated area surrounding a school where traffic and safety regulations are applied to protect students and pedestrians, determined and marked by the City Planning and Development Department (CPDD), considering the specific layout and surrounding roads of each school.”
 - Letter **e**, Vehicle, shall be defined as “Any conveyance or other device propelled or drawn by any means and includes a bicycle and, where the context permits, includes an animal driven or ridden but does not include a train.”
 - Letter **f**, Driver shall be defined as “Person who operates, drives, or has control of the directional and mobile power of a motor vehicle.”
 - Letter **h**, Pedestrian shall be defined as “any person who goes, travels on foot, or walks on any road, thoroughfare, or highway.”
- Under Section 4, in the first paragraph, add the words “actively used by students.”
- Under Section 5, letter **c**, to add the provision “All School Zone boundaries shall be clearly marked on-site and, where practicable, reflected in publicly accessible maps or official issuances.”

- Under Section 6:
 - Letter a, Speed Limit Enforcement, number 1, be read as:

“All motorists within designated School Zones shall comply with the speed restrictions and standards prescribed under Republic Act No. 4136 or the Land Transportation and Traffic Code, particularly Section 35 thereof, and as strictly enforced when passing through school zones, approaching high pedestrian activity such as school arrival and dismissal times. In all instances, drivers shall operate vehicles at a careful and prudent speed, having due regard for traffic conditions, road width, visibility, and the presence of pedestrians, and shall not drive at a speed greater than will permit them to stop within the assured clear distance ahead.

Outside of such circumstances, the applicable speed limits under national law and existing traffic regulations shall govern.”
 - Letter d, Strict Parking Regulations, the following provisions were provided, viz:
 - (1) Parking or stopping in a manner that obstructs or endangers pedestrian movement.
 - (2) As a minimum safety standard, double parking, obstruction of driveways, and parking within 15 meters from the immediate approach side of a school gate or pedestrian lane shall be penalized, when such area is officially identified and signposted as a critical safety or conflict point by the DPOS and the TTMD.”
 - (3) Any restriction on parking shall apply only where such restrictions are properly designated and clearly marked.
- Under Section 7, letter c, the provision on Crossing Guards and Traffic Aides was also amended.
- Under Section 8, the provision on Lead Agency for Road Safety was also amended, reflecting that the TTMD shall serve as the lead agency, etc.
- Under Section 9:
 - Enforcement Agencies shall now be read as “Enforcement of this Ordinance shall be undertaken through a coordinated inter-agency framework, consistent with applicable laws and subject to proper deputization where required.”
 - The functions of DPOS and BCRD were also added.

- Under Section 11, letter **d**, Issuance of Traffic Violation Receipts (TVRs) and Ordinance Violation Receipts (OVRs) shall be read as “Authorized traffic enforcers and personnel after having been duly deputized by the TTMD, MMDA, and/or DPOS, shall issue TVRs and OVRs, respectively, to persons found in violation of this Ordinance, in accordance with existing city laws and regulations.”
- Section 15, Penalties for Violations, shall be read as: “As a general rule, any violation of this Ordinance shall be penalized in accordance with the applicable provisions of Ordinance No. SP-3172, S. 2023, pursuant to the Metro Manila Development Authority Resolution No. 2023-02.”
- Section 18, Repealing Clause, be read as: “All ordinances, resolutions, rules, and regulations or parts thereof which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby superseded or modified only insofar as such inconsistency exists, etc.”
- The Effectivity (Section 19) shall be read as: “This Ordinance shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its complete publication in a newspaper of general circulation in Quezon City and its posting in at least three (3) conspicuous public places within the city for three (3) consecutive weeks, whichever occurs later.”
- All councilors present shall be included as introducers of the measure.

Finally, on motion, duly seconded, **PO23CC-116** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, as amended.

- The proposed “QC Green and Resilient Awards” shall be conducted annually with the mandate to recognize and reward outstanding performances of city-based organizations and agencies that have rendered exemplary contributions in Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (DRRM), Climate Change Adaptation (CCA), and humanitarian assistance programs, particularly those protecting high-risk communities from extreme hazards.
- It also aims to promote green and sustainable practices and encourage their integration into the regular and institutionalized practices of other communities within the city.

- The proposed ordinance demonstrates that Quezon City is forward-looking and supportive of sustainable practices, while promoting innovation in disaster risk reduction, green projects, and sustainable development programs.

- The proposed measure aims to support the implementation of QCU's Institutional Development Plan, further enhancing the quality and accessibility of higher education for the City's constituents.

The Presiding Officer expressed support for the measure and commended the Lady Proponent for institutionalizing the QCU's development plan, noting that it is an important and necessary initiative.

- The proposed ordinance includes provisions on the definition of terms, scope, and coverage involving all departments, offices, agencies, and barangays of the Quezon City Government.
- Provides provisions for the institutionalization of QC E-Services, with priority services on the platform including business permits and licenses, building and construction permits, real property tax payments, community tax certificates, civil registry services, health services, social welfare services, public safety services, environmental services, education services, and employment services.
- It seeks to institutionalize the Quezon City ID system, which will serve as the identification system for QC residents, as well as non-residents who transact or work in the city, and also provides its registration process.
- It also institutionalizes the security and privacy provisions of QC E-Services, as well as the service standards expected from the platform. It details user rights and user responsibilities, and provides information regarding support centres for assistance.
- Accessibility for all is likewise an important provision included in the measure, ensuring that traditional over-the-counter services shall remain available alongside QC E-Services. The QC Help Desk shall likewise remain available to accommodate all users, including Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) and senior citizens, and to provide language accessibility in both Filipino and English.
- It likewise provides for the establishment of the QC E-Services Committee, including its functions. Similarly, the measure includes provisions on liabilities and administrative penalties.

The Presiding Officer commended the Lady Proponent for introducing another needed measure.

- As the Chairperson of the Committee on Justice and Human Rights, she believes that justice must not only be fair, but also be humane.

It also calls for stronger coordination among the local government, the Bureau of Jail Management and Penology (BJMP), Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD), Department of Justice (DOJ), the Parole and Probation Administration, civil society organizations, faith-based groups, and the private sector.
- The initiative upholds basic human rights, promotes rehabilitation, and ultimately contributes to a safer community. It was emphasized that it is not merely a measure of leniency, but one of responsibility, recognizing that successful reintegration benefits not only the individual but society as a whole.
- As Chairperson of the Committee on Justice and Human Rights, she firmly believed that a humane justice system must also be restorative.

The Presiding Officer emphasized the significance of the measure, noting its potential benefits for PDLs. He expressed his full support for the proposed measure.
