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On motion of Councilor Pumaren, duly seconded, **PO23CC-063** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from the Proponent, and the adoption of the amendments made:

- Online misinformation in the Philippines reached a record high of 67% in early 2025, which was attributed to the politically charged midterm election season. This was the highest level since the country was included in the Reuters Institute Digital News Report in 2020. The proliferation of false online content and the growing use of AI-generated media contributed to public confusion and the spread of misinformation.
- Limiting the spread of false content is crucial. Educating citizens to distinguish factual information from fraudulent content is equally essential. To address this, the proposed ordinance establishes a digital well-being program to be implemented across workplaces, public educational institutions, and local communities, aiming to safeguard public well-being in a technology-driven society by ensuring the said schools, workplaces, and local communities are equipped to manage digital risks.
- The proposed ordinance institutionalizes the mandates of the DepEd, which involve not only topics about cyberbullying and cyber safety, but also digital citizenship that involves digital literacy, which is the ability to evaluate information using technology.
- It also seeks to localize national mandates and implement them in workplaces in Quezon City to promote media literacy and digital well-being.
- During the Committee on Laws hearing, representatives from the Schools Division Office (SDO), Youth Development Office (YDO), City Legal Department, and Public Affairs and Information Services Department (PAISD) were present and did not object to the proposed ordinance.
- The passing of the ordinance would embed digital well-being in schools, workplaces, and barangays. This aims not only to address online harms but also to actively protect the future of QCitizens.

The Presiding Officer recommended adding other related terms, such as “healthy digital culture,” “e-safety,” “cybersecurity,” “digital defense,” “digital balance,” and “digital citizenship,” be likewise need to indicate in the Definition of Terms of the measure, as he noted “digital well-being,” “educational institutions,” “media literacy,” and “workplace” were already mentioned. The Proponent responded affirmatively and clarified that these topics had already been discussed under Section 6 of the proposed measure.

The Presiding Officer likewise sought clarification on the provision in Section 4 stating that “This program shall be imposed in workplaces with at least one hundred (100) employees and all educational institutions within the territorial jurisdiction of Quezon City,” noting that it limits the coverage of the proposed measure. His Honor further inquired on the basis for such limitation and whether the measure should instead apply to all workplaces regardless of the number of employees.

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In response, Councilor Pumaren explained that the initial decision to set the threshold at 100 employees was intended to cover organizations with a larger workforce. However, he conveyed that they are amenable to removing the limitation to make the program more accessible to all Quezon City residents.

A short recess was declared.

Following the resumption of the session, His Honor stressed that the removal of the limitation to 100 employees would help workplaces. Councilor Pumaren replied in the affirmative.

- The proposed ordinance aims to boost inclusivity, community well-being, and economic growth by setting clear and fair guidelines for pet-friendly establishments.
- In recent years, a significant increase in pet ownership has been experienced in the country, particularly among younger individuals who regard pets as integral members of their households.
- As of 2024, there are an estimated 16.4 million dogs and 2 million cats living in registered households, with approximately 42% of Filipino families owning at least one pet.
- The proposed ordinance seeks to support this growing demographic and promote inclusive local tourism by establishing guidelines for pet-friendly establishments to better accommodate residents and visitors traveling with companion animals, while ensuring that participating businesses maintain safe, hygienic, and responsible operations.
- The ordinance underwent public consultation to gather inputs from key community stakeholders. Representatives from private entities, including SM malls and other mall owners, were invited. Representatives from the City Administrator's Office, Business Permits and Licensing Department (BPLD), and City Veterinary Department were also present on behalf of the Quezon City Government. Prominent animal welfare organizations, including the Philippine Animal Welfare Society (PAWS) and the Animal Kingdom Foundation, likewise participated in the consultation.
- Valuable feedback gathered during the public consultation helped refine the ordinance to ensure that its final text reflects its primary objective of maintaining harmony among pets, pet owners, and the general public using commercial spaces.
- The ordinance sets guidelines for both pet-friendly establishments and pet owners, including comprehensive safety and health protocols. It provides that service animals shall be permitted to accompany their handlers in all areas of an establishment at all times, provided that they are properly trained or kept on a leash or harness.
- The proposed ordinance requires establishments seeking official designation as pet-friendly to register with both the City Veterinary Department and the BPLD. Upon registration, qualified establishments shall be issued a pet-friendly certificate.
- Quezon City has been recognized as an animal welfare city, and through cooperation, responsible pet ownership, and business compliance, the measure ensures the City's commitment to becoming a more pet-friendly community.

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The Presiding Officer expressed that the proposed measure is timely and needed.

- The necessity of clean, sanitized, and free-of-charge restroom facilities in commercial establishments is anchored on public welfare, particularly health, dignity, and accessibility.
- The proposed ordinance mandates that all commercial establishments open to the public maintain proper sanitation standards and ensure that restroom facilities are provided with continuous clean water, sufficient soap, accessible containers, and adequate toilet paper in each cubicle for the use of both employees and customers.
- The ordinance also prohibits the collection of any fee for restroom use, ensuring that access remains free and available, as some commercial establishments currently charge restroom fees, creating a barrier to a basic human need.
- High-traffic venues, such as shopping malls, already generate substantial revenue through tenant rentals. Thus, the provision of free and accessible restroom facilities should be treated as a fundamental service to their patrons.
- During the public hearing, the invited stakeholders expressed support for the measure but raised concerns regarding patrons who prefer to use pay lounge restrooms.
- Araneta Center-Cubao submitted a position paper recommending that establishments should still be allowed to maintain restrooms with a charge, but Persons with Disabilities and Senior Citizens be allowed to use such facilities free of charge.
- The ordinance aims to prohibit charging fees for using restrooms; however, establishments may still charge fees only for the use of their other lounge facilities.
- The measure emphasizes that clean public restrooms provide a safe and hygienic environment for waste disposal and hand washing, which helps prevent the spread of infectious diseases.
- As recognized by the United Nations, access to sanitation is a basic human right, and providing clean, safe, and private facilities respects the dignity of every individual to manage a universal biological need.

The Presiding Officer expressed support for the measure.

**PO23CC-131** – AN ORDINANCE RESTRUCTURING THE ACCOUNT BALANCE OF THE DELINQUENT BENEFICIARIES OF VARIOUS QUEZON CITY-OWNED OFF-CITY RESETTLEMENT SITES LOCATED IN RIZAL PROVINCE (*Introduced by Councilors ATTY. VICENTE BELMONTE, JR., LUIGI D. PUMAREN and ALY MEDALLA*)

The Committee on Laws, Rules & Internal Government recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- to amend the 4th Whereas clause, to be read as:

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provision stated in the said Contract, the qualified beneficiaries also agreed to pay the penalty of two percent (2%) per month in case of failure to pay the agreed monthly amortizations and the 3.165% per annum as interest;

- to amend the 10<sup>th</sup> Whereas clause, to be read as:

WHEREAS, the proposed restructure of the subject delinquent accounts shall, in essence, entail the condonation of penalties and interest that have accumulated as of December 31, 2024, relative to the delinquent beneficiaries;

- to amend the 1st paragraph of Section 1, to be read as:

The monthly payments for the principal amount shall be restructured, while the existing penalties and interest that have been accumulated as of December 31, 2024 charged against each delinquent account shall be condoned;

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- to amend Section 5, to be read as:

The HCDRD shall submit the list of names of all the subject beneficiaries of this Ordinance who can avail the benefits of this ordinance within the period of 2 years from the effectivity of this ordinance; and

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

The Committee on Urban Poor & Human Settlement recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

On motion of Councilor Belmonte (Vicente), duly seconded, **PO23CC-131** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from the Proponent, and the adoption of the amendments made:

- The proposed ordinance authorizes the restructuring of delinquent accounts of socialized housing beneficiaries residing in various Quezon City-owned off-city resettlement sites in the Province of Rizal.
- The program was originally initiated through a Memorandum of Agreement in May 2018 and was subsequently ratified through Resolution No. SP-7556, Series of 2018. It covers one thousand (1,000) housing units across five (5) housing projects, namely: St. Therese in Teresa, St. Martha Homes in Morong, Virgen dela Paz in Antipolo, La Solidaridad Estate Homes 1-A in Rodriguez, Rizal, and San Antonio Village in Rodriguez, Rizal.
- The beneficiaries acquired each housing unit at a package cost of Three Hundred Thousand Pesos (PhP300,000.00). However, due to the economic challenges brought by off-city relocation and the financial effects of the pandemic, many families were unable to pay their monthly obligations on time. As a result, the two percent (2%) monthly penalty imposed under the standard contract continued to accumulate, trapping the beneficiaries from continuing delinquency.
- In response to the petition submitted by the residents on August 5, 2024, the Quezon City Housing Board passed Resolution No. 006, Series of 2024, paving the way for the beneficiaries to receive financial relief.
- The ordinance serves as a vital intervention by formally condoning all accumulated penalties and interests charged against the accounts as of December 31, 2024.
- Under Section 1, the remaining principal balance shall be restructured under a new contract for a maximum period of thirty (30) years, subject to a stable annual interest rate of 3.165%.
- To facilitate the economic recovery, the measure provides for a graduated payment scheme during the first five (5) years before transitioning to equal monthly installments for the remainder of the term.

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- Eligible beneficiaries shall have a period of two (2) years from the effectivity of the ordinance to avail of the program through the Housing Community Development and Resettlement Department.
- While the measure provides compassionate relief, it also maintains fiscal responsibility by requiring an initial payment equivalent to one monthly amortization upon signing of the restructured contract and clearly warns that continued default will compel the City to initiate extrajudicial eviction proceedings to re-award the units to other qualified beneficiaries.
- Progress requires balancing social empathy with legislative order. The proposed ordinance ensures that relocated constituents can protect their homes.

The Presiding Officer expressed that this is a very important measure.

**Amendments:**

- To amend the 4<sup>th</sup> whereas clause to expressly include the interest rate of 3.165% per annum, to read as follows: *“Whereas, pursuant to the provisions of the said contracts, the qualified beneficiaries likewise agreed to pay a penalty equivalent to two percent (2%) per month in case of failure to pay the agreed monthly amortizations, in addition to the interest at the rate of 3.165% per annum.”*
- To amend the 10<sup>th</sup> whereas clause to clarify the condonation of accrued penalties and interest, to read as follows: *“Whereas, the proposed restructuring of the subject delinquent accounts shall, in essence, entail the condonation of penalties and interest accumulated as of December 31, 2024, relative to the delinquent beneficiaries.”*
- To amend the first paragraph of Section 1 of the dispositive portion, to include the accrued interest at the rate of 3.165% per annum, to read as follows: *“The monthly amortization corresponding to the principal obligation of qualified beneficiaries with delinquent accounts are hereby restructured, and all penalties and interest accumulated and charged against such delinquent accounts as of December 31, 2024, are hereby condoned. The outstanding balance shall continue to earn interest at the rate of 3.165% per annum for a maximum of thirty (30) years from the date of approval and the revised amended contract. Payment shall be made under a graduated payment scheme during the first five (5) years, and thereafter, the sixth (6<sup>th</sup>) year until the thirtieth (30<sup>th</sup>) year, the remaining balance shall be amortized in equal monthly installments.”*
- To amend Section 5 to include the timeframe within which the ordinance must be complied with, to read as follows: *“Section 5. The HCDRD shall prepare the list of names of all subject beneficiaries of this ordinance who shall be entitled to avail of and benefit from the restructuring program herein provided. Beneficiaries covered by this ordinance shall be given a period of two (2) years from the effectivity hereof, within which to comply with and avail themselves of the restructuring program and corresponding benefits provided under this ordinance. Failure to comply within the prescribed period shall render the beneficiary ineligible to avail of the benefits herein granted.”*
- To adopt all the amendments made during the committee deliberations.
- To include all councilors present as co-introducers of the measure.

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**PO23CC-142** – AN ORDINANCE MANDATING FOOD ESTABLISHMENTS WITHIN THE TERRITORIAL JURISDICTION OF QUEZON CITY TO HAVE AT LEAST ONE (1) STAFF CAPABLE OF RESPONDING TO CHOKING EMERGENCIES DURING EVERY EIGHT (8) HOUR PERIOD OF OPERATION, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF  
(Introduced by Councilor *LUIGI D. PUMAREN*)

- Amended version is attached on pages 103 to 104 of the order of business..

The Committee on Laws, Rules & Internal Government recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- that an amended version of the proposed ordinance will be submitted, incorporating inputs from resource persons; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

The Committee on Health & Sanitation recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- that the conduct of a public consultation will take place to encourage active community participation and provide opportunity to raise concerns to further strengthen the measure; and
- to include all Councilors as Co-Introducers

The Committee on Trade, Commerce & Industry recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- to amend the proposed ordinance in accordance with the discussion during the hearing; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

On motion of Councilor Pumaren, duly seconded, **PO23CC-142** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations and revisions:

- The ordinance intends to promote the safety and health of customers and staff by ensuring immediate and effective response to emergencies, particularly choking incidents within food establishments.
- The World Health Organization (WHO) and other international health bodies note that choking is a common cause of injury and death worldwide, especially among children under five years old, with over 100,000 deaths recorded annually.
- Choking on food is a high-risk medical emergency that frequently occurs in restaurants, cafes, and other food establishments, requiring immediate and decisive intervention.
- Immediate application of proper anti-choking procedures can be life-saving and significantly minimize harm before professional medical services arrive.

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- Quezon City promotes its food establishments through a combination of economic development programs, tourism initiatives, and the health/safety of its patrons.
- The ordinance mandates that all food establishments assign at least one staff member per 8-hour shift who has completed a first-aid training course, including modules on choking response and CPR, to serve as a first aider during operating hours.
- Establishments shall ensure that their accredited first aiders obtain certification from Quezon City-accredited training providers and keep their certification current.
- The ordinance underwent public consultation on April 14, 2026, attended by private stakeholders who expressed no objections and even noted that some already have staff trained in basic life support.
- The amended version of the ordinance adopted the penalties recommended by the City Administrator's Office.
- The ordinance not only passes regulations but also ensures that every establishment in the community has a literal lifeline standing by.
- The ordinance transforms businesses from passive bystanders into proactive guardians of public safety.
- **Amendments:**
  - o In Section 5, paragraph **b**, to change the word “First Aid” to “Basic Life Support,” hence it shall read “Maintain and update their **Basic Life Support** certification through regular refresher trainings, at least two (2) years.”
  - o To adopt the submitted amended version of the ordinance.
  - o To include all the councilors present as co-introducers of the measure.

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The Committee on Laws, Rules & Internal Government recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- to amend the title, to be read as:

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 9 OF QUEZON CITY ORDINANCE NO. SP-3016, S -2021, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS "AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A RENTAL HOUSING PROGRAM FOR QUALIFIED BENEFICIARIES OF QUEZON CITY SOCIALIZED HOUSING PROJECTS," BY RECLASSIFYING THE "RENTAL HOUSING TRUST FUND" INTO A "RENTAL HOUSING SPECIAL ACCOUNT UNDER GENERAL FUND," AND AMENDING PARAGRAPH (3) THEREOF TO EXPRESSLY INCLUDE PAYMENTS FOR LEASED PARKING SPACES/AREAS AS PART OF THE PAYMENTS, REMITTANCES, AND OTHER SUMS COLLECTED FROM BENEFICIARIES THAT SHALL FUND THE SAID SPECIAL ACCOUNT;

- to amend the 5<sup>th</sup> Whereas clause, to be read as:

WHEREAS, based on the assessment of the Commission on Audit (COA), the classification of the receipts and expenditures regarding these "Rental Housing Trust Fund" should be recorded and maintained under the Trust Fund - Trust Liabilities, but under the Local Government Code of 1991 Section 309, paragraph (b), which state that: "Trust fund shall consist of private and public moneys which have officially come into the possession of the local government or of a local government official as trustee, agent, or administrator, or which have been received as guarantee for the fulfillment of some obligation. A trust fund shall only be used for the specific purpose of which it was created or for which it came into the possession of the local government unit;"

- to replace the 6<sup>th</sup> Whereas clause, to be read as:

WHEREAS, the rental fees collected from the beneficiaries are internally generated and do not originate from external sources such as donations or grants in accordance with Section 309 (b) of Republic Act No. 7160, which defines trust funds as those received from third parties with a specific purpose, these collections do not qualify for trust fund classification. Therefore, establishing a separate trust fund for these collections would not be appropriate. Instead, this fund should be accounted for Trust Liabilities under the General Fund, especially if their use is designated for specific purpose;

- to amend the title of Section 1, to be read as:

Reclassification of the rental housing trust fund into the rental housing special account under general fund;

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- to amend the 3<sup>rd</sup> paragraph of Section 1, to be read as:  
     “... leased commercial space, facilities, and parking slots ...”; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

The Committee on Urban Poor & Human Settlement recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- to change the term “Rental Housing Account” to “Rental Housing Special Account under the General Fund;” and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the proposed measure

On motion of Councilor Belmonte (Vicente), duly seconded, **PO23CC-160** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations and adoption of the proposed amendments:

- This is an amendatory ordinance that reclassifies the Rental Housing Trust Fund into a Rental Housing Special Account under the General Fund.
- This technical correction directly addresses the Commission on Audit’s Observation Memorandum No. 2025-042, which noted that PhP7.831 Million in housing rental collections were misclassified under General Fund Trust Liabilities.
- Under Section 309 (b) of Republic Act 7160, stand-alone trust funds are reserves strictly for external third-party moneys, but because the rental fees are internally generated, transitioning this framework to a special account under the General Fund ensures strict compliance with Section 6 of COA Circular No. 2016-005 and paragraph 27 of the IPSAS 1 by preserving all revenues exclusively for land cost recovery.
- Simultaneously, the measure updates paragraph 3 to expand the fiscal intake framework by explicitly including future revenues from leased parking spaces and commercial areas. Since the standardized parking system in commercial space lease programs is an independent policy undergoing separate committee hearings, this amendment does not activate those systems; it simply creates the compliant financial container to receive those revenues once they are formally approved.
- Administered by the Housing Community Development and Resettlement Department (HCDRD), this technical adjustment satisfies the state audit mandates while securing a transparent, legally sound financial loop for the socialized housing program.
- **Amendments:**
  - In the title, to include the phrase “**UNDER GENERAL FUND**” after the phrase “Rental Housing Special Account.”

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- The 5<sup>th</sup> Whereas clause shall read as follows: “WHEREAS, based on the assessment of the Commission on Audit (COA), the classification of the receipts and expenditures regarding these ‘Rental Housing Trust Fund’ should be recorded and maintained under the Trust Fund – Trust Liabilities, but under the Local Government Code of 1991, Section 309, paragraph (b) which states that: Trust Fund shall consist of private and public moneys which have officially come into the possession of the local government or of a local government official as trustee, agent or administrator, or which have been received as guaranty for the fulfillment of some obligation. A trust fund shall only be used for the specific purpose of which it was created or for which it came into the possession of the local government unit.”

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The Committee on Laws, Rules & Internal Government recommended approval, with remark:

- that an amended version of the proposed measure will be submitted

The Committee on Appropriations recommended approval, during their Joint Hearing with the Committee on Laws, Rules & Internal Government, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

The Committee on People with Disabilities recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- to amend Section 3, paragraph c, by deleting “PWD ID that is expired, which validity period, as indicated on its face or as prescribed by the issuing office, has lapsed or terminated;”
- that resource persons from PDAO, BPLD, ITDD, City Legal, DPOS, QCPD, QCPC, and representatives from different malls and other stakeholders operating in Quezon City are likewise invited and interpose NO OBJECTION to the proposed measure;
- that the BPLD and Legal Department will submit their respective comments and suggestions to the proposed ordinance; and
- to include Councilors Nicole “Nikki” V. Crisologo and Victor “Vic” D. Bernardo as Main Introducers of the proposed ordinance

The Committee on Trade, Commerce & Industry recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

On motion of Councilor Pilar, duly seconded, **PO23CC-169** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations and amendments:

- The measure shall be known as the “Quezon City Anti-Fake PWD ID Ordinance of 2026.”
- It is known to the public that there is a proliferation of fake IDs and unauthorized use of fake PWD IDs, not just in Quezon City, but in the entire country. This is only inimical to the business and the economy, and impairs the integrity of the benefits granted by law to the true beneficiaries. The government alone cannot cease the said illegal act.
- In the ordinance, commercial establishments are given authority, subject to some identified extent, to help the Quezon City Government in preventing the unauthorized use and taking hold of invalid PWD IDs.

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- Mentioned the gist of the ordinance found in Section 5 (Authority to Hold Identification Cards); determination of the grounds based on the QC Registry System; Creation of the Technical Working Group (TWG) and its functions; and funding.
- The measure had undergone public consultations and a thorough review.

**Amendments:**

- The following modifications during the public consultations and committee hearing were adopted:
  - In the title, the word “confiscate” shall be changed to “to take hold of and deliver to”;
  - Under Section 8, the Technical Working Group will be chaired by the head of the Persons with Disability Affairs Office (PDAO) and co-chaired by the head of the Business Permits and Licensing Department (BPLD); and
  - For Administrative Penalties on Individuals - Any person who shall violate Section 11 of this Ordinance shall be meted with the following administrative penalties: 1<sup>st</sup> Offense - the amount of Five Thousand Pesos (PhP5,000.00) shall be amended to “One Thousand Pesos (PhP1,000.00)”;
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> Offense – the amount of Ten Thousand Pesos (PhP10,000.00) shall be amended to “Three Thousand Pesos (PhP3,000.00)”;
  - and 3<sup>rd</sup> and Subsequent Offenses – the amount of Fifteen Thousand Pesos (PhP15,000.00) shall be amended to “Five Thousand Pesos (PhP5,000.00).”
- To include all councilors present as introducers of the measure.

  - To adopt all amendments introduced during committee hearings.
  - To submit an amended version to the Office of the Secretary to the Sangguniang Panlungsod.
  - To include all councilors present as co-introducers of the measure.

**Including all councilors present as co-introducers of the measure**, on motion of Councilor Vicente Belmonte, duly seconded, **PR23CC-560** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations:

- It formally adopts the Quezon City Local Shelter Plan for 2026 to 2030.
- Pursuant to the statutory mandates of Republic Act No. 7160 and Article I, Section 3 of Ordinance No. SP-2771, S-2018, the Local Housing Board is legally mandated to update the Shelter Road Map every five (5) years as part of the Social Development Sector of the Comprehensive Development Plan.
- To ensure full compliance with the enhanced housing sub-sector guidelines, the update underwent an extensive process of technical reviews, multi-sectoral consultations, and focus group discussions.
- In a formal letter dated January 9, 2025, the Department of Human Settlements and Urban Development (DHSUD) officially approved the said 2026 to 2030 plan, certifying that it successfully satisfies all national recommendations.
- Their data highlights a critical shelter backlog of 57,142 households and a validated count of 214,733 Informal Settler Families (ISFs) in Quezon City.

- By adopting the measure, they will streamline their Urban Planning, fulfil their statutory obligations, and build safer, disaster-resilient, and dignified communities. Hence, the Proponent looked forward to the favorable consideration of the foregoing measure.

- The collaboration of the Quezon City Tourism Department and other concerned offices is important to ensure the effective implementation.

- The proposed resolution seeks to encourage greater public awareness so that QCitizens can make informed decisions regarding their health and safety.
- It also reminds the public that medical procedures should always be performed by qualified healthcare professionals and that products used should be properly registered with the appropriate regulatory authorities.
- Through awareness and education, it helps ensure that the citizens are protected and that public health remains the priority in the communities.

- Republic Act No. 7279, or the Urban Development and Housing Act, the local government unit is legally and morally mandated to uplift the underprivileged citizens by providing affordable housing, prioritizing onsite development whenever possible.
- The physical implementation of the said crucial urban development projects inevitably forces families out of their homes temporarily. The proposed resolution addresses that dangerous gap, offering an immediate financial lifeline to alleviate their social conditions and prevent homelessness while they await formal permanent government housing options.
- The city government’s authority to act is firmly anchored in Section 16 of the Local Government Code of 1991, which empowers local governments to promote the general welfare and preserve the comfort and convenience of their inhabitants.

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- The City Budget Department has officially released a certification confirming an available appropriation of over Twenty-Eight Million Pesos (PhP28,000,000.00) for the donation accounts, social service program under the Office of the City Mayor for Fiscal Year 2026.
- Pursuant to Ordinance No. SP-3465, S-2025, the fund is specifically allocated to provide financial assistance to both the non-fire-affected families and the fire-affected families living in the vicinity of NIA Road who lost their homes to the recent blaze.
- By utilizing the certified funds, it ensures that the displaced households are secure, have a safe temporary shelter, and keep their family intact during the transition.
- Mere progress means that they do not leave anyone behind.

The Acting Presiding Officer (Councilor Herrera) stated that he believed the proposed measure was very important, as there was a need to alleviate the condition of those affected. He then inquired whether the proposed resolution was specifically intended for those affected by the NIA Road fire incident and whether the Proponent knew how many families would benefit from the PhP28 Million allocation.

Councilor Belmonte (Vicente) clarified that the PhP28 Million allotted by the City Budget Department was exclusively intended for the families affected in the NIA Road fire incident, while the proposed resolution covered all families displaced by the national government and Quezon City housing projects. The NIA Road incident had only recently occurred; thus, the affected families would become the first beneficiaries upon the passage of the proposed measure.

The Proponent confirmed the Acting Presiding Officer's statement that, in the future, passing a resolution to authorize the City Mayor will no longer be necessary when the city plans to provide a subsidy.
