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At the latter part of the session, Councilor Pumaren moved that **PO23CC-133** be **REVERTED to second reading** for some additional manifestations that will be made part of the official records of the measure.

Hearing no objection, the motion was carried.

The Proponent explained that although the measure was approved on second reading on March 2, 2026, a clarification was necessary to address a discrepancy between the locational plan and the ordinance text. The locational plan indicates a total area of 5,580 square meters covering three consolidated lots under TCT Nos. 004-2019007189, 004-2019007188, and 004-2024007482, while the ordinance states a gross area of 5,514 square meters, reflecting only the actual target area of the project to be developed. The 66-square-meter difference pertains to an encroached portion that will be excluded and resold separately by the developer, without affecting the main project site.

Moreover, Councilor Pumaren reiterated that the Applicant had complied with the minimum requirements of the implementing standards, rules, and regulations of Quezon City Ordinance No. SP-056, S-93, and the Presidential Decree No. 957, otherwise known as the Subdivision and Condominium Buyers Protective Decree.

Thereafter, with no other clarifications, on motion, duly seconded, **PO23CC-133** was **APPROVED** on its second reading.

- refinement of staffing structure with duties and responsibilities and creation of plantilla positions;
- strengthening of implementation, funding, and governance provisions by designating the City Health Department as the implementing office and the creation of a Citizen Charter instead of the Implementing Rules and Regulations; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure;

The Committee on Appropriations recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure;

The Committee on Civil Service, Appointments and Reorganization recommended approval.

The Committee on Health and Sanitation recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- an additional Section shall be inserted addressing the implementation of an Information & Public Awareness Drive. This section will empower citizens by explaining the scope of services and medicines offered, clarifying eligibility and coverage under the pharmaceutical benefit packages, setting realistic expectations around availability and limitations; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

On motion of Councilor Matias, duly seconded, **PO23CC-057** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from the Lady Proponent, and an amendment **to include all councilors present as co-introducers of the measure:**

- The proposed ordinance seeks to institutionalize and regulate the operation of the district pharmacies of Quezon City under the Quezon City Health Department, to be located at the district action offices. The facilities serve as important access points for affordable and subsidized medicines, particularly for indigent and vulnerable Quezon City residents.
- The District Pharmacies shall be formally established and standardized as *QCitizen's Botika ng Districts 1 to 6*. The proposed ordinance further requires all District Pharmacies to secure and maintain a license to operate from the Food and Drug Administration and to obtain PhilHealth accreditation, including accreditation under the PhilHealth Guaranteed and Accessible Medications for Outpatient Treatment or GAMOT Package.

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- Following committee deliberations and consultations with the Human Resource Management Department and other concerned offices, the staffing structure of the proposed District Pharmacies was significantly strengthened. The amended version increases the proposed Pharmacist II positions from six (6) to fourteen (14), removes the previously proposed Pharmacy Aide and Administrative Aide positions, and adopts a pharmacist-led operational model consistent with professional standards and the Index of Occupational Services – Local Government Unit (IOS-LGU).
- Included also in the amended version is the rationalization and reclassification of existing Food and Drug Regulation Officer (FDRO) positions into the corresponding Pharmacist positions consistent with Civil Service Commission policies, the IOS-LGU, and RA No. 10918, otherwise known as the Philippine Pharmacy Act.
- The proposed measure protects incumbent personnel through a Co-Terminus with the Incumbent or CTI mechanism, thereby ensuring that there is no diminution of rank, salary, benefits, rights, or security of tenure.
- The proposed measure likewise authorizes the designation of Cluster Supervisors among qualified Pharmacist II personnel, strengthens operational oversight of the District Pharmacies, and designates the Pharmacy Section of the Quezon City Health Department as the lead implementing office.
- The proposed ordinance professionalizes the operation of the district pharmacies, strengthens access to medicines, enhances regulatory compliance, maximizes PhilHealth opportunities, and aligns the staffing structure of the Quezon City Health Department with national standards.

The Presiding Officer expressed his full support for the proposed measure and stated that the Proponent had already defended it before several committees, including the Committee on Laws; hence, no further discussion was deemed necessary.

In the period of amendments, the Lady Proponent manifested that during the committee deliberations and technical review, the following amendments were introduced:

- Two (2) additional whereas clauses were inserted to recognize the need for the rationalization and reclassification of existing Food and Drug Regulation Officer (FDRO) positions and to emphasize Plantilla alignment, accountability, efficiency, continuity of service, and health governance objectives.
- Section 7 was substantially revised by increasing the Pharmacist II positions from six (6) to fourteen (14), deleting the proposed Pharmacy Aide and Administrative Aide VI (Encoder) positions, and adopting the corresponding IOS-LGU qualification standards.
- A provision was inserted authorizing the City Health Officer to designate at least two (2) Pharmacist II personnel as Cluster Supervisors for monitoring, coordination, operational oversight, and related supervisory functions.
- Section 8 was revised by removing the duties and responsibilities of the Pharmacy Aide and Administrative Aide VI positions and expanding the duties and responsibilities of Pharmacist II personnel.

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- Original Section 9 on Additional Personnel was deleted in its entirety.
- A new Section 9 was inserted providing for the reclassification of existing FDRO positions into the corresponding Pharmacist positions, namely: FDRO I to Pharmacist I, FDRO II to Pharmacist II, and FDRO III to Pharmacist III.
- Provisions were inserted establishing the treatment of occupied FDRO positions as Co-Terminus with the Incumbent (CTI), without diminution of rank, salary, rights, benefits, or security of tenure, and providing for the immediate reclassification of FDRO positions.
- A provision was inserted directing the Human Resource Management Department, in coordination with the Department of Budget and Management and the Civil Service Commission, to undertake the necessary plantilla modifications, qualification standards alignment, and personnel actions required for implementation.
- The Effectivity Clause was revised to align the measure with the publication and posting requirements prescribed under Republic Act No. 7160, otherwise known as the Local Government Code of 1991.

Councilor Matias stated that the amendments were introduced primarily to adopt the recommendations of the Human Resource Management Department, align the staffing structure with the IOS-LGU and Republic Act No. 10918, strengthen the professionalization of pharmaceutical services, protect incumbent personnel, and ensure the sustainable operation of the District Pharmacies of Quezon City.

- The amended version was submitted to the Secretary to the Sanggunian for proper recording and inclusion in the official legislative records of the Sangguniang Panlungsod.
- To include all councilors present as co-introducers of the measure.

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On motion of Councilor Malañgen, duly seconded, **PO23CC-122** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from the Proponent, and the amendments **to submit an amended version of the proposed ordinance, including Councilors Medalla (Aly), Herrera, and Belmonte (Vicente) as principal authors of the proposed measure:**

- The proposed ordinance was initiated by the request of the TODA President and tricycle drivers and operators because of the unforeseen socio-economic disruption caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, subsequent economic challenges and conflicts, and other personal circumstances affecting operators; a considerable number of tricycle franchises were not renewed within the prescribed period, from 2018 to 2025.
- The Quezon City Government extended support to TODA by giving financial assistance, TODA assistance such as rice, vegetables, and grocery items, numerous times. Despite this support from the government, financial difficulties still swarm the TODA; hence, numerous operators failed to renew their franchise.
- A series of public consultations was conducted, which was attended by all TODA Presidents or their representatives, counterparts, and representatives from the Executive Department. Attendees were requested to formalize their opinions and suggestions, which were already incorporated in the proposed ordinance.

The Presiding Officer manifested his full support for the proposed amnesty measure, emphasizing its significant benefits for tricycle operators. He affirmed his ongoing commitment to the welfare of tricycle drivers.

Councilor Malañgen expressed her gratitude to the Presiding Officer for his support and for providing food to the attendees of the public consultation.

- The proposed ordinance intends to promote and safeguard the health of the Quezon City residents by addressing significant public health issues, specifically rising rates of diet-related chronic diseases like obesity, type 2 diabetes, and cardiovascular conditions.
- Lack of knowledge regarding balance diet, portion control, and food preparation contributes substantially to poor eating habits and subsequent health issues.
- The proposed ordinance establishes comprehensive nutrition education as a vital and effective preventive measure promoting healthy eating habits to combat nutrition-related diseases across all barangays, workplaces, and educational institutions in Quezon City to foster a culture of health and wellness for all Quezon City residents.
- The comprehensive nutrition education program shall cover the following topics:
 - 1) The importance of macro and micronutrients.
 - 2) Understanding food labels, serving sizes, and calorie content.
 - 3) The dangers of consuming processed foods, sugary drinks, and high-fat snacks.
 - 4) Prevention of lifestyle diseases (such as diabetes, hypertension, and obesity) through diet.
 - 5) Food safety, hygiene, and proper sanitation.
 - 6) Promoting local and indigenous healthy food choices.
- In educational institutions, the subject matter stated shall be integrated into relevant learning areas and shall allocate ten hours per school year for nutrition education.
- While in barangays, the barangay shall integrate subject matter in the following ways:
 - By developing and conducting regular programs such as seminars or workshops.
 - Incorporating nutrition education into existing community activities.
 - To disseminate relevant nutrition materials and/or conduct campaigns through the use of digital platforms.
- While in both private and public workplaces within Quezon City, it is encouraged to promote nutrition education.
- The City Administrator's Office interposes no objection to the enactment of the proposed ordinance and recommends its approval, subject to a possible editorial refinement to clarify the role of the implementing agencies.
- In compliance with Section 11, the City Schools Division, Barangay Community Relations Department, and the City Health Department shall recommend modular, appropriate materials for the nutrition education.
- During the Committee on Laws hearing, representatives from the City Health Department and Barangay and Community Relations Department (BCRD) were present and also interposed no objection to the passage of the proposed ordinance. The BCRD representative manifested that barangays are mandated to allocate one percent (1%) of their budget to nutrition-related projects; therefore, they possess the necessary funds to integrate the program.

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- It is recommended that Section 6 explicitly state that the integration of the comprehensive nutrition Education Program must align with the curriculum and subjects mandated by the Department of Education. The said recommendation has been incorporated into the amended version of the proposed measure.
- Establishing the comprehensive nutritional framework is not merely a policy enhancement, but a critical investment in the long-term vitality, productivity, and health of every Quezon City resident.

The Presiding Officer stated that the proposed measure was urgently needed to support their advocacy and healthy city initiatives. He emphasized that under the leadership of Mayor Joy Belmonte, the initiative would provide substantial and meaningful assistance to the community.

The Presiding Officer highlighted Section 6 of the proposed ordinance regarding Nutrition Education in Educational Institutions, and the integration of specific subject matter into relevant learning areas. He inquired whether it aims to mandate curriculum inclusion. He emphasized that the Department of Education (DepEd) has exclusive authority over curriculum standards according to Republic Act 9155. He also noted an inconsistency in the language that seems to both encourage and require integration, while deferring to DepEd's mandate. He warned that although local government can promote, fund, and support supplementary programs, it cannot unilaterally alter the prescribed national curriculum without appropriate coordination.

The Presiding Officer suggested an amendment to Section 6, as follows: “Educational institutions in Quezon City are encouraged to integrate the subject matter stated in Section 5 into relevant learning areas in coordination with the Department of Education and may allocate up to ten (10) hours per school year for nutrition education.”

Councilor Pumaren reiterated that during the previous Committee on Laws meeting, the committee had recommended that the integration of the comprehensive nutrition education program under Section 6 must align with the curriculum and subjects mandated by the Department of Education (DepEd).

The Presiding Officer concurred with the proponent’s manifestation, adding that the measure was clearly aligned with the DepEd’s mandates.

Councilor Pumaren stated that he knew the Presiding Officer understood the importance of informing citizens about proper nutrition so that they could make more informed decisions to lead healthier lives and prevent various diseases.

The Presiding Officer added that the discussion centered on long-term solutions and emphasized that education was the key approach.

PO23CC-135 - AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING BARANGAY PANTRIES IN QUEZON CITY TO REDUCE FOOD WASTE AND PROMOTE A FOOD SURPLUS DONATION SYSTEM *(Introduced by Councilor LUIGI D. PUMAREN)*

- Amended version is attached on pages 64-69 of the order of business;

The Committee on Laws, Rules & Internal Government recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- that an amended version of the proposed ordinance will be submitted incorporating inputs during the committee hearing; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

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The Committee on Food Security and Urban Agriculture recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- to include the Climate Change and Environmental Sustainability Department (CCESD) as part of the implementing agency to ensure coherence with the existing food rescue program;
- to add a Whereas clause to explicitly reflect the current nutrition situation of under-five and school-age children;
- to expand the objectives of Barangay Pantry Program;
- to clarify the provisions of Section 10 of the proposed measure regarding the issuance of Certification, particularly with respect to the Environmental Sanitation Department of Quezon City;
- to specify the composition of the Screening and Assessment Committee in Section 14 of the proposed measure;
- to incorporate additional Whereas clauses, as follows:

“Whereas, food waste contributes significantly to environmental degradation and the loss of resources, community-led pantries have emerged as a grassroots solution to redistribute surplus food and promote solidarity;

Whereas, it is imperative to ensure that such initiatives are conducted in a manner that safeguards public health and environmental sanitation.”

- that the Department of Sanitation and Clean-Up Works of Quezon City be included in the implementation of the proposed measure; and
- to adopt a checklist to ensure compliance with sanitation and hygiene protocols.

The Committee on Social Services recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- that Ms. Ma. Lorelei Salvador, OIC of SSDD, Ms. Jirah Sideco from QCHD, and Atty. Nestor Acope from the BPLD expressed their support for the proposed Ordinance;
- to ensure that the implementing mechanisms are practical and aligned with existing laws, rules, and regulations; and
- that a Public Consultation shall be conducted to gather inputs, comments, and recommendations from concerned sectors and establishments.

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On motion of Councilor Pumaren, duly seconded, **PO23CC-135** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from the Proponent, and the adoption of the amendments made:

- June 2025 Social Weather Stations (SWS) survey revealed that 21.7% of Filipinos in Metro Manila experienced involuntary hunger, defined as having gone without food at least once in the past three months. The Philippine Institute for Development Studies reported that the country generates approximately 2,175 tons of food waste daily.
- Bridging this gap directly supports the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) to end hunger and achieve food security.
- The proposed ordinance aims to promote food security, alleviate hunger, and work toward achieving zero food waste in Quezon City. Covered establishments include grocery stores and supermarkets with at least 500 square meters of selling space, without precluding smaller establishments from voluntarily donating food, as well as food manufacturers and distributors engaged in the commercial processing, packaging, and production of food products for sale.
- The objectives set forth under Section 5 of the proposed ordinance in establishing the Quezon City Barangay Pantry Program were stated on record.
- The measure defines edible food surplus as packaged or sealed food products that may be stored at room temperature, remain unsold or unconsumed, have not been previously opened, contain no packaging defects, and are still safe for consumption upon delivery to the barangay pantry. Such food products must have at least thirty (30) to sixty (60) days remaining before their expiration or best-before date.
- Following consultations with the concerned offices, the Quezon City Climate Change and Environmental Sustainability Department (CCESD) was designated as the implementing agency of the said program, in view of its role in managing the forthcoming QC Food Rescue Program.
- The beneficiaries of the Barangay Food Pantry Program shall be systematically identified to ensure that assistance reaches those most in need, with prioritization based on the beneficiary registry established under the QC Food Rescue Program. The designated beneficiaries are identified under Section 7 of the amended version of the ordinance.
- The CCESD, in coordination with the respective barangays, shall assess, verify, and maintain an official registry of eligible beneficiaries.
- The registration of food donors, screening and assessment procedures, distribution of surplus edible food, and monitoring and evaluation shall be led by the CCESD in coordination with the City Health Department. Food donors that have been assessed, inspected, and approved by the Screening and Assessment Committee shall not be held liable upon the release of edible food surplus.

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- During the Committee on Laws deliberation, representatives from the Social Services Development Department (SSDD), City Health Department, Barangay and Community Relations Department (BCRD), Business Permits and Licensing Department (BPLD), Climate Change and Environmental Sustainability Department (CCESD), and the City Legal Department participated and raised no objections to the measure. However, several recommendations were proposed.
- The City Health Department recommended expanding the list of beneficiaries to include wasted children currently enrolled in barangay feeding programs and children aged six (6) to fifty-nine (59) months. The CCESD recommended that, in cases involving partnerships, the concerned barangay shall serve as the contracting party to the agreements. The City Legal Department recommended including provisions on proper disposal and imposition of stricter penalties, such as permanent delisting in place of community service. These recommendations were duly incorporated into the amended version of the ordinance.
- The Proponent emphasized that through institutionalized cooperation and data-driven targeting, the initiative transforms the citywide food rescue efforts from a temporary relief into a sustainable and long-term solution.

The Presiding Officer commended the Proponent for his comprehensive discussion of the measure.

PO23CC-151 - AN ORDINANCE MANDATING THE ADOPTION OF ELECTRONIC PAYMENT (E-PAYMENT) SYSTEMS FOR ALL BARANGAY FEES, CHARGES, AND TRANSACTIONS IN ALL ONE HUNDRED FORTY-TWO (142) BARANGAYS OF QUEZON CITY, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES (*Introduced by Councilor CHARM M. FERRER, CPA, MPA, JD*)

The Committee on Laws, Rules & Internal Government recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- to delete the word “ALL” in the title before “BARANGAY FEES”;

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- to amend Section 2 to be read as follows:

SECTION 2. DECLARATION OF POLICY. It is hereby declared the policy of the Quezon City Government to promote transparency, efficiency, and accountability in the delivery of public service by mandating the adoption of electronic payment (e-payment) systems for the payment and collection of barangay fees, charges, and other lawful amounts in all one hundred forty-two (142) barangays of Quezon City. The City Government shall ensure that the implementation of this policy promotes digital financial inclusion and modernizes local government transactions, consistent with applicable national laws and regulations;
- to enhance and simplify Section 3;
- to enhance Section 4 and change its title to “ADOPTION OF E-PAYMENT AS PRIMARY MODALITY”;
- that in Section 4, delete the sentence “All payments for barangay fees and charges shall be made through electronic or digital payment methods. Cash payments shall be discouraged and may only be allowed under exceptional circumstances as determined by the Barangay Treasurer”;
- to add a new Section on “MANDATORY AVAILABILITY OF CASH AS SECONDARY OPTION”;
- that in Section 6, change the word “residents” to “a requesting party”;
- to add a new provision on Uniform Guidelines;
- to add a new Section on “BARANGAY E-PAYMENT ACCOUNTS”;
- that in Section 7, delete the phrase “either in printed or electronic form”;
- to include “Strict financial oversight shall be maintained through the dual-access monitoring provided to the City Treasurer’s Office and the City Accounting Department” in the Section on Implementation and System Management;
- to remove in the Penalty provision the following:
 - Audit Compliance: Standardized procedures for the Barangay Treasurer to document cash transactions and ensure they are integrated into the real-time monitoring system accessible by the City Treasurer and City Accounting Department.

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- be subject to administrative sanctions in accordance with existing laws, rules, and regulations.
- to include in the Penalty provision the clause: “shall be held liable in accordance with Republic Act No. 11032 and other applicable laws, rules, and regulations;”
- to include a provision for Implementing Rules and Regulations;
- that an amended version will be submitted; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

The Committee on Barangay Affairs recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

The Committee on Information Communication Technology or Cybertechnology recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- in Section 2: reframe the declaration as a policy of the City Government rather than just the individuals;
- in Section 3: delete item 3 “business-related barangay endorsement or clearance” and item 4 “Barangay permits and clearances”;
- in Section 4: Establish a specific minimum transaction amount for the application of e-payments instead of leaving the “exceptional circumstances” solely to the discretion of the Barangay Treasurer; and
- to include Councilors Atty. Jesus Miguel Suntay, Wencerom Benedict C. Lagumbay, Luigi D. Pumaren, Victor “Vic” D. Bernardo, Erwin Rey “Cocoy” A. Medina, Jhon Angelli “Sami” C. Neri and Joseph Joe Visaya as Co-introducers

On motion of Councilor Ferrer, duly seconded, **PO23CC-151** was **APPROVED** on its second reading, with the following manifestations from the Lady Proponent, and the adoption of the amendments made:

- The proposed ordinance seeks to modernize local governance by mandating the adoption of an electronic payment (e-payment) system for all barangay fees, charges, and transactions across the one hundred forty-two (142) barangays in Quezon City.
- The measure is aligned with national mandates, including the Local Government Code of 1991, the Ease of Doing Business Act of 2018, and the Electronic Commerce Act of 2000. It designates secure BSP-supervised digital payment platforms as the primary mode of collecting barangay fees, clearances, and facility rentals.

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- The transition to a uniform web-based interface integrated with the City’s QC Pay Easy Platform shall ensure a more transparent, efficient, and accountable delivery of public services.
- While the ordinance mandates the use of digital payments for barangay business permit fees, it also incorporates equity and inclusivity safeguards by maintaining traditional cash payments as a secondary option for senior citizens, persons with disabilities (PWDs), unbanked households, and, in instances of technical or network failures.
- To ensure financial integrity and data security, the proposed ordinance provides for a phase 1 implementation timeline, providing backend real-time transactions oversight for the City Treasurer’s Office, the City Accounting Department, and the Commission on Audit (COA), while ensuring compliance with the provisions of the Data Privacy Act of 2012.
- **Amendments:**
 - All amendments are aligned with the comments of the Business Permits and Licensing Department (BPLD), City Administrator’s Office, City Accounting Department, and City Treasurer’s Office.
 - To delete the word “*ALL*” in the title before “*BARANGAY FEES*.”
 - To amend Section 2, Declaration of Policy, by enhancing the entire page to replace the term “Barangay” with “Quezon City Government,” and to include the phrase “one hundred forty-two (142) barangays of Quezon City.” To insert the following sentence: “The City Government shall ensure the implementation of this policy, promote digital financial inclusion, and modernize local government transactions, consistent with applicable national laws and regulations.”
 - To enhance Section 3, Coverage, by simplifying and categorizing the items.
 - To change the title of Section 4 from “MANDATORY ADOPTION OF E-PAYMENT” to “ADOPTION OF E-PAYMENT AS PRIMARY MODALITY.”
 - To delete the provision in Section 4 stating “All payments for barangay fees and charges shall be made through electronic or digital payment methods. Cash payments shall be discouraged and may only be allowed under exceptional circumstances as determined by the Barangay Treasurer.”.
 - To add a new provision to be read as “Mandatory Availability of Cash as Secondary Option.”
 - To add a new provision, titled: “Implementing Mechanism and Compliance.”
 - To amend Section 6, Accepted Modes of E-Payment, be replacing the word “residents” with “a requesting party.”

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- To add a new provision on “BARANGAY E-PAYMENTS ACCOUNT.”
- To delete the phrase “either in printed or electronic form” in Section 7, relative to the issuance of official receipts.
- To add “The Quezon City Information Technology Department shall provide technical guidelines and guidance, and support to the one hundred forty-two (142) barangays onboarding to the city's universal order of payment and electronic official receipt system within one (1) year from the enactment of this ordinance.”
- To add in Section 8, Implementation and System Management, “Strict financial oversight shall be maintained through the dual-access monitoring provided to the City Treasurer's Office and City Accounting Department.”
- To remove from Section 11, Penalty Clause, the phrase “be subject to administrative sanctions in accordance with existing laws, rules, and regulations.”
- To include in the Penalty provision the clause: “shall be held liable in accordance with Republic Act No. 11032 and other applicable laws, rules, and regulations.”
- To include another provision for the Implementing Rules and Regulations.
- To submit an amended version of the ordinance.
- To include all councilors present as co-introducers of the measure.

PO23CC-156 - AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A BUSINESS ANALYTICS PROGRAM TO SUPPORT SMALL, NANO, AND MICRO BUSINESSES IN QUEZON CITY (*Introduced by Councilor LUIGI D. PUMAREN*)

The Committee on Laws, Rules & Internal Government recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- that an amended version of the proposed ordinance will be submitted incorporating inputs during the committee hearing; and
- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

The Committee on Barangay Affairs recommended approval, with amendment:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers of the measure

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The Committee on Information Communication Technology or Cybertechnology recommended approval, with amendment:

- The Committee on Micro, Small & Medium Business and Entrepreneurship Development & Cooperative recommended approval, with amendments and/or remarks:

- to include all Councilors present as Co-Introducers

On motion of Councilor Pumaren, duly seconded, **PO23CC-156** was **APPROVED** on second reading, with the following manifestations from the Proponent, and the adoption of the amendments made:

- The proposed ordinance seeks to promote inclusive economic growth by empowering nano, micro, and small enterprises (NMSEs) through data-driven decision-making.
- The establishment of a Business Analytics Program aims to provide accessible and timely data services to help enterprises improve their competitiveness and ensure their long-term sustainability.
- There are more than sixty thousand (60,000) registered small businesses and more than twenty thousand (20,000) unregistered vendors in Quezon City, which serve as the lifeline of the local economy. However, many of these enterprises fail within their first three (3) years of operation due to poor cash flow management, inventory wastage, and the lack of data-driven business planning.
- While business analytics has proven to be a tool in improving profitability and business resilience, such tools often remain inaccessible to small entrepreneurs due to high cost and technical limitations.
- As the global economy continues to rapidly digitalize, helping small businesses with access to modern data analytics tools has become essential for their survival and competitiveness.
- The Proponent stated on record the provisions of Section 5 of the ordinance, which enumerate the business analytics support services to be provided by the Small Business and Cooperatives Development and Promotions Office (SBCDPO), in coordination with the Business Permits and Licensing Department (BPLD).

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- Section 6 of the proposed ordinance mandates the establishment of District Data Clinics wherein every district in Quezon City shall designate at least two (2) Business Analytics Coordinators who shall conduct monthly analytics literacy seminars, train business owners on how to read simple charts of their sales, and assist nano enterprises in transitioning from paper-ledgers to their business analytics tools.
- Businesses actively participating in the program and utilizing the toolkit for at least six (6) consecutive months shall be eligible for a Smart Business Certification that shall serve as a seal of excellence that may be displayed in their establishments and shall entitle them to priority access to Quezon City's Capital Assistance Programs and other business support programs.
- During the Committee on Laws hearing, representatives from the SBCDPO, the BPLD, and BCRD were present. No objections to the proposed measure were raised. On the contrary, the representative from the SBCDPO informed the Committee that their office already has ongoing projects in the area, utilizing simple tools, such as Excel sheets for nano enterprises. The representative further stated that following the rationalization process, the number of Business Analytics Coordinators shall be increased to two (2) per district under the supervision of the SBCDPO.
- The Proponent stressed that the passage of the ordinance would not only support the sustainable growth of businesses in Quezon City but would also ensure that these businesses have a competitive edge to thrive in today's economy.

The Presiding Officer commended the Proponent for the comprehensive sponsorship of the ordinance.

- Empowering the barangays to create localized Codes of Discipline enables them to clearly define acceptable behavior, establish reporting mechanisms, and protect victims, particularly women and children.
- The measure recognizes the vital role of GAD Focal Persons as advocates and protectors at the community level.
- Implementation of a Barangay Code of Discipline promotes accountability, awareness, and a culture of respect.

In response to the query of the Acting Presiding Officer (Councilor Herrera) on whether any barangays have adopted their own Code of Discipline (CODI), the Proponent explained that no formalized CODI has been adopted yet. However, he noted that barangays regularly remind their personnel to act appropriately, particularly when handling sensitive matters involving women and children. He emphasized that such conduct should not merely be a matter of practice, but should form part of the standard day-to-day decorum of all barangay personnel.

The Acting Presiding Officer (Councilor Herrera) further opined that the resolution is laudable and suggested studying the conversion of the same into an ordinance in the future, to which Councilor Rodriguez agreed.
